





FROM THE SKI DESK

The Texas Ski Council trips have now been chosen, SCSC trip leader applicants have been considered and lined up for our anticipated 1992–93 trip schedule, and the Ski Desk is rolling along! Since probably 95% of our members are not aware of the TSC selection process, I thought I'd take a minute to explain...

THIS YEAR, over 17 operators offered 40 proposals to the TSC Pre-Select Committee, who narrowed that list down to 18 after considering trip price, location & accessibility, resort ability to accommodate and provide facilities for 300 to 1200 TSC members, their experience in dealing with large groups, the activities offered, and sufficient terrain to accommodate various skiing levels. Each club is given a set number of votes based on their size, and since Space City is in the largest division, we are allowed 5 votes. A meeting of delegates is held after the bid presentations to discuss each destination, and then a roll call vote is taken and all votes tallied. In case you haven't heard the outcome of this year's TSC Bid Meeting yet, here it is...

FOR THANKSGIVING -- how about guaranteed snow? The only resort in Colorado with two gondolas and added capacity to cut lift lines in half -- the Outback skiing experience -- a \$6 million dollar Outpost restaurant complex at an 11,044 foot elevation -- the TSC FALL ROUNDUP WILL BE AT KEYSTONE, COLORADO.

FOR TSC TRADITIONAL -- where our very own JERRY MONTGOMERY has been selected as Vice President for the entire Texas Ski Council and 120 SCSCers will experience a down-home real Western atmosphere that often boasts up to 27 feet of champagne powder -- 80 of us will converge upon STEAMBOAT SPRINGS from January 9-16th and 40 from January 12-17th - YAHOO!

The TEXAS EXPEDITION begins January 28th to INNSBRUCK, AUSTRIA with a diversity of ski areas within 30 minutes from the city's center -- side trips to include Salzburg, Venice, the Royal Bavarian Castles, and a possible overnighter in Amsterdam -- not to mention that SCSC's PAM HOLDER has been selected as Expedition Coordinator for the entire Texas Ski Council.

For the WINTER SHOOTOUT -- a new destination for the TSC -- the largest year-round resort in its state -- hi-tech snowmaking on 85% of its 45 skiable miles -- where \$10 million has been invested over the past six years -- rated the #1 ski resort experience in its region three years in a row by Snow Country Magazine and last year as the #2 resort in North America only behind Deer Valley, Utah -- SUGARLOAF, MAINE, A NEW ENGLAND EXPERIENCE from February 20th-27th. Be one of the first to visit this resort where a lift has been built right in the middle of the condominium complex to whisk you up onto the slopes!




