8. As of this writing, it appears SCSC will win the Texas Ski Cup. Two first place finishes with Heavenly Valley to come.

At the start of the year, your officers were faced with a large negative budget. Such items as increased print

ing costs for the *Sitzmarke*, 25th Anniversary Party, and earlier airline deposits were major contributing factors. Final figures are to come, but it appears we will come close to a break even situation. A special fee was initiated on trips and activities which we felt was a stop-gap until dues could be increased for 90-91. Unless something unforeseen occurs, this Executive Committee will not recommend a dues increase for next year.

A committee was formed to study changing our early sign-up procedures. Airlines and resorts are insisting on larger and earlier deposits. Texas Ski Council fees are being increased to allow TSC to continue offering us a quality product on Council trips. You may see a system put in place where you can sign up on next year's trips as early as July 1st. Your new officers will keep you fully informed.



I want to personally thank each and every member, particularly those who volunteered and made things happen. A special thanks to the officers and board members who spent countless hours in meetings.

I don't know if anyone reads this stuff, but I went back to my May article. Volunteers have made this club successful for 25 years. I'm proud to be a part of that tradition - and I hope you will also become involved.



ASPEN RE-VISITED

During the 39th Annual Winterskol Celebration in Aspen this year, I had the opportunity to participate in the celebration along with 30 + other Space City Ski Club friends. Having been a member in SCSC for ten years and, also not missing a Winterskol Celebration in those 10 years, I wanted to share some of the experiences and events that took place.

First, the mechanics of the trip. With the current trend of airlines offering Frequent Flyer Reward Programs, many of our group considered the land package only. However, with the low cost of air that we were able to negotiate from Continental (direct flight into Aspen) many people chose the full air and land package, which was under \$700. The Condo accommodations, Lift One, was located right at the base of Aspen Mountain, with bus to Snowmass stopping at our front door. Together with a special group rate on lift tickets, this trip turned out to be very economical, yet provided the first class accommodations that our members expect.



It was a wonderful trip and we all hope that the "Board" will consider returning to Aspen in '91, and put an end to "Renegade Trips".






That early Saturday morning



• Best Location of Post-Trip Parties (An SCSC Special Award) Home of Ron and Roberta Rambin who have been gracious hosts for many SCSC events.


• Most Original Screenplay - goes to Winnie and Dave Pullen on their posttrip article all in poetry: (See Summit articles - March Sitzmarke).

APPLICABLE STANDING RULES OF SPACE CITY SKI CLUB, INC.

5.0 TRIP PENALTIES

- 5.1 If a trip participant withdraws from a trip after the specified date, the trip participant will lose his entire payment unless he or she can be replaced · · g list 'le Tri rdina ' able t over s r all "" particinati's cost in cancellation of lodaina, transa 1 the tion, and/or other commitments. The trip participant will be entitled to the entire amount recovered by replacement or cancellation or arrangements less the cancellation fee stipulated in Section 5.2 of these Standing Rules and any extra expenses incurred by the Club in cancelling any of the refun Also 'Trip 7 linato 1 1 n dete ig the iously ts. Th s prof oss wi be a f arrai to exercise a reasonable effort in cancelling accommodations or finding a replacement, the Executive Committee will award the refund, less the cancellation fee.
- 5.2 CANCELLATION FEES.
 - A. A participant may forfeit his full deposit if he fails to notify the Club in writing of his intent to withdraw prior to the published final payment dates. A minimum charge of \$10 will be assessed for each trip cancellation, and such charges will be increased by \$5 per calendar month for each additional calendar month or portion thereof the participant's reservation is held prior to cancellation. Cancellation fee, however, may not exceed the amount of the trip deposit.
 - B. A participant cancelling from more than one trip shall be charged \$25 in addition to the calculated cancellation fee for each cancellation subsequent to the first cancellation.
- 5.3 A charge of \$5.00 will be assessed for each trip transfer made prior to final payment date. A transfer will not be considered after final payment date unless a replacement can be secured.
- 5.4 Deposit, transfer and cancellation charges for non-domestic trips shall be determined by the Executive Committee and included in the trip release form as well as in all trip publicity; in no case shall these requirements be less than those provided in Sections 5.2 and 5.3 of these standing Rules.
 7.0 RESTRICTIONS.
 - 7.1 Allowing non-trip participants to occupy any room as a non-registered guest is strictly prohibited, and in violation of Club policy and subjects the member to disciplinary action.
 - 7.2 The illegal use of controlled substances during Club trips, or on any other official Club function, is in violation of Club policy, and is strictly prohibited.
 - 7.3 No substitutions of trip participants shall be allowed without the knowledge and approval of the Trip Coordinator, and new additions to the trip shall come from that trip's Waiting List. The Trip Coordinator shall make all substitutions.
 - 7.4 It is the policy of the Club not to allow the active solicitation of the general membership at a Club function or in the Club publication for any other than Club sponsored trips or activities without the consent of the Executive Committee.
 - 7.5 No person may participate in a Club sponsored trip, or participant paid activity, without first completing a written and signed Release of Liability for that trip or activity, on a form approved by the Board of Directors.
- 8.0 MISCELLANEOUS.
 - 8.1 SKI TRIP SIGN UP
 - A. No member shall be allowed to sign up for any ski trip prior to the September General Meeting except as designated by prior approval of the Executive Committee.
 - B. Each member may sign up for him/herself and one other member on any ski trip or ski trip waiting list.
 - 8.2 WEATHER. If a trip should be "weathered-in" the additional lodging expense will be left up to the individual, although the Trip Coordinator will assist in making accommodation arrangements, and collection for same shall be left up to the lodge.
 - 8.3 NON-SKI TRIPS/ACTIVITIES. Reservations for participation in such activities may require full payment, instead of a deposit fee.
