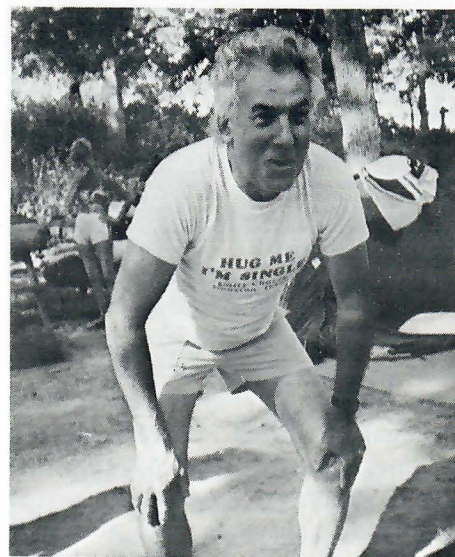
After rafting and a very good campsite dinner, Chuck Ratliff initiated Patti Richards and Manolo Valle as

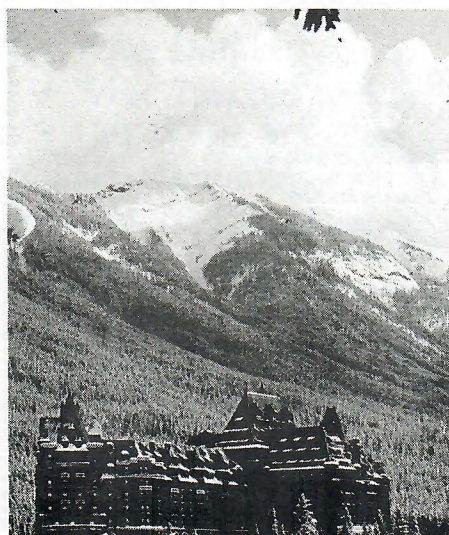
BANFF, CANADA TSC FINAL SHOWDOWN March 17-24, 1991

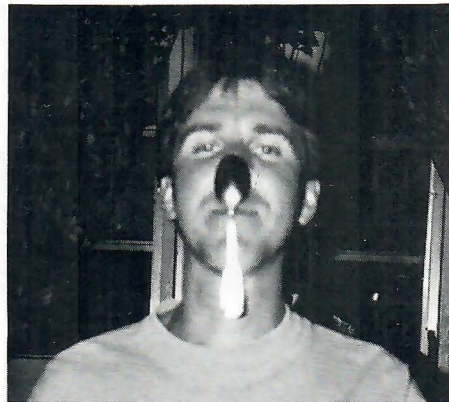

Back at Rum Point we took time out for lunch, and Terry was overheard



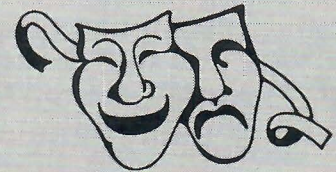
"Are we having a good time, or what?"

THE BOARD SPEAKS... ABOUT SCSC TRIPS

Perhaps you have been wondering what process Space City Ski Club goes through to get to the ski trip schedule that we all enjoy each year. Well here are some answers to those questions you have been asking.

The process begins with an invitation from the Texas Ski Council (SCSC is a Founding Member) to the various U.S. and foreign ski areas to bid on our business. Why, you ask, would these resorts do this? Because the Texas Ski Council, or TSC, has been making arrangements for Texans to go skiing for 18 years now and represents 20 ski clubs with a combined membership of over 10,000 skiers. Over these 18 years, the TSC has developed a good reputation as a group that treats all ski areas fairly, as a group that delivers what it promises and as just a good group to have come to their resort. If you represented a ski area, wouldn't you want this group to come ski at your area?

The bid responses are narrowed down to a reasonable number by a TSC Pre-Bid Selection Committee and then those areas selected make a presentation to the Council at the April meeting. The Council members vote on the four U.S. trips and the foreign trip for the next ski season at this meeting.

Behind the scenes, your Vice President of Trips is busy talking to all of the areas making bids to find out if Space City can get the same deal offered to the Council because not all the areas will get the TSC trips but SCSC may still want to ski there (*REMEMBER the trip survey you were supposed to fill out??*).

Space City has been arranging trips and activities for its members for 26 years now, and the things said about the TSC reputation also apply to SCSC. We use our good name and reputation to get the best possible deals for club members AS A GROUP. When someone goes to a merchant or business and says they represent SCSC and they are actually just a member on their own, any damage to property, misunderstanding, or other problem can reflect badly on the club. We will not allow this type of behavior to continue because we have worked hard over the years to develop and maintain good relationships with many ski areas. This is a VOLUNTEER club, so GET INVOLVED. If you know of a good place or places for the club to go to, approach the officers and discuss your ideas. You might be surprised to find out how receptive they are to new ideas and your helping to carry them out.

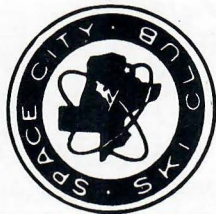
