## GOLD FOUND IN THE HILL COUNTRY <br> by Robert Olsen

Thar's gold on them hills. That is correct, but the gold is not of the metallic variety nor is it the black liquid kind that built many a Lone Star fortune. This gold comes from a helfdozen Hill Country vineyards and wineries in a wide selection of varietal white wines. They make red wines too. b We know because Space City Ski Club sent a delegation of dedicated oenophiles to search the hills between San Marcos and Fredricksburg for the Napa Valley of Texas. Seven hundred miles and thirty-six wines later we can definitely report the following: Texas

Saturday nite found the group entranced by restauranteur-musician Bill Knight at his Langston House in New Braunfels. Bill's piano playing added a special touch to the elegant atmosphere. Connie Hinshaw and Sally Helfer were both seen but not heard while accompanying Bill at the piano. The specially selected wines included a Teysha Cellars Chardonnay from Lubbock, Trimbach Gewurztraminer, De Boeuf Beaujolais Villages and Moyer 'Texas' Champagne. Most folks opted for the veal with, of course, marsala wine sauce.

wines are getting better and traditional southern hospitality makes a trip to the winery a memorable experience.

The variety of wines was matched by the variety of our energetic tasting team. Charles Van Tassel favored the Fall Creek Granite Red made on the shores of Lake Buchanan ( $\$ 7.99$ at Wines of America and $\$ 7.03$ at Spec's Warehouse). This writer preferred the Chardonnay from recently built Grape Creek Vineyards near Stonewall (soon to be found at Beef \& Bird).

Former Napa wine tour leader, Bob Nielsen, enjoyed the variety of excellent wines found at Oberhellmann Vineyards a few miles north of Fredricksburg. Wonderful hospitality included a special tasting of the new drier, white wines sold under the Bell Mountain label and a picnic in the vineyard. The wines compete in price and quality with their Napa Valley counterparts: the Chardonnay is $\$ 12.99$ at Wines of America and a mere $\$ 10.52$ at Spec's.

Tom Hogle, Dick Howard and Bev Merrit still had energy left for a tour of beautiful downtown Gruene after dinner, but the heavy eyelid crew prevailed and that story had to wait for Sunday afternoon.



Will the wine industry help save the Hill County economy?

Deciding whether to spend Sunday morning tubing on the Guadalupe River or visiting the factory outlet mall in New Braunfels was no decision for Jeanne Neu and Janet Pickell. They organized the charge to the mall. Everyone found something to take home with the leather shop getting the most traffic.

Next stop was historic Gruene, overlooking the Guadalupe River. Our usual perspective of Gruene is from the river looking up. However, things were looking up in Gruene for Denise Landers and Ruth Fowler. They found not one, but two tastings rooms: Wimberly Valley Wines and Wimberly Valley Winery. Ample samples were available. However, most folks had seen enough fermentation tanks and headed instead for the Grist Mill Restaurant to eat and watch the tubers float down river.

It was questionable whether little old tourer Bob Olsen could rally the troups for one more winery. However, a glass of bubbly always seems to rally the spirit. Last stop on the wine tour was the Moyer (Champagne) Winery which is just a few minutes away from Gruene. They made the sparkling wines served at the Economic Summit, thus claiming an international clientele. Judging by the purchases, this stop was one of the most popular.

We learned that Moyer is now owned by a French consortium; the original owners have returned to their wine business in Ohio. Winemaker Henri Bernabe buys wine from other

## NASTAR IS FOR EVERYONE

Want a fun way to improve your skiing? Participate in NASTAR with your fellow skiers on your next trip!

NASTAR, NAtional Standard Race, is designed for skiers of any ability, age and sex. The course is set on an intermediate slope consisting of 12 sto 30 gates, comprising a giant slalom course which any skier of any ability can complete. A daily course time is set by the area's pacesetter; this is the "clock" you race against. Gold, silver and bronze medals are awarded to those skiers that ski closest to the course pacesetter's time. Obviously, the closer one skis to that time, the higher the medal qualified for. An allowance (handicap) is made for age and sex: the younger one is, the tougher the medals are to come by, and the older one is, the easier the medals. Additional allowance is given if you are a female. There is no limit on how many medals can be awarded during
any one race day. Approximately $60 \%$ of the people racing at an area receive a gold, silver or bronze medal.

Participating in NASTAR improves one's skiing ability. It requires successive turns at specific points on the slope and skiing in a confined area. Additional improved skills are better weight distribution and sharper reflexes. The ski areas conduct NASTAR clinics weekly to explain and practice startfinish techniques, ski line selection through the course, edge control, ski posture and practice runs on a race course. The lessons learned and practiced on the race course will benefit all recreational skiers regardless of ability, and this is something SCSC endorses.

On Texas Ski Council Trips (of which Texas Ski Week is the biggest of the year), ski clubs from throughout Texas use the NASTAR program to race against each other in friendly competition and for bragging rights. Each club member that completes the race
(no matter how slowly) is awarded a point for his club toward the Ski Council race trophy. Faster times and medals count for more. Therefore, more club members participating and medals won help SCSC win the race trophy.

Competing in club sponsored NASTAR is an excellent way to meet members of SCSC and other Texas clubs. As the racers enter the starting gate, the crowd lining the course shouts encouragements to ski the course to the best of your ability. Soon, you'll feel the warmth of participation with a great group of people, as well as a sense of accomplishment at completing a goal you have set for yourself.

On your next trip, participate in the club sponsored NASTAR events and enjoy the fun.
