

# TO A LARGER CUP

# **HEAD OF THE LIFTLINE**

Many of you will recall the meeting in April of last year when Ron Smith, then President, took possession of the Texas Ski Cup, filled it with champagne and drank to our success. Many of you also have commented upon his absence at many of our functions this year which I will now explain as due to the unmentionable disease which he picked up from the Alpine Ski Club who, as the prior year's winner, was reluctant to let it go. (That is almost as bad as Autumn Leaves.)

Those of you who stood with Autumn in the long lines at last September's meeting to take advantage of low cost trips obtained some firsthand experience of the value of the Texas Ski Council. Quite briefly, the Texas Ski Council is comprised of twenty-one Texas based snow skiing clubs, of which Space City is the largest with approximately 18% of the total membership. In addition to providing the obvious benefit of mass purchasing and the resulting discounts and amenities, the Council sponsors what is known as the TEXAS SKI CUP CHALLENGE SERIES. Elsewhere in these pages you will notice that the program trips this year include the Fall Roundup at Keystone, Texas Ski Week at Steamboat, the Winter Shoot-out at Crested Butte and the Final Showdown in Heavenly Valley. On each of these trips, representatives of the Council promote downhill slalom racing according to a prescribed procedure.

The whole idea of racing is to encourage participation and friendly competition among the clubs of the

Council. The scoring system recognizes the clubs with the most good skiers at each event and not just those with numerical strength or a few outstanding skiers.

The Ski Council Race Committee, which governs the racing program, is headed by our own Jim McIntyre. Each of the four specific trips will have a race coordinator and a committee comprised of the race representatives from each participating club. Sherry Lewis is our Club Race Director and her responsibility is to coordinate with each of the trip race directors to ensure that we know the rules, abide by them, and encourage maximum participation.

The race itself is on a basic NASTAR course which typically is on a smooth average hill skiable by anyone who has ever been on skis. It is a giant slalom layout under normal circumstances. Each club races in the same time slot against a pace setter whose time becomes the standard against which each of our times is compared to determine points in the competition. NASTAR medals are also awarded based on the age handicapping system. Since the course conditions change during the day, a new standard time is established before each club races. Each racer has one run unless he has a false start or some sort of malfunction. To finish gets us at least one point regardless of your time.

On Council trips, one or more cups will be awarded for the trip event and points will be awarded the club toward the Texas Ski Cup Trophy. When Space City won last year, it was because of several second place finishes which allowed us to accumulate more total points toward the Cup. I keep referring to *THE* Cup; however, it is really three cups because there are three divisions in the Texas Ski Council based on numbers in each club.

Each month when I receive the Sitzmarke and turn to this column to find out what I said, the picture at the top of the page reminds me that we are not getting any younger. To satisfy the geriatric set, the Council has created a Senior's Division for individual racers. These races have nothing to do with the Cup, but are just further competition among the individual clubs, and trophies are awarded to individual participants who are selected by the race director on each trip from among the participants attending. What defines a senior depends on the number of participants on the trip, but it is essentially 47 to 50 for men and 42 to 45 for women.







Big Sky offers two major mountain ranges, two gondola systems, over 55 miles (40 trails) of skiing for all levels and more area to ski than people in line. With an average snowfall of 400 inches per year. Temperatures compare to Sun Valley and Vail and low humidity promotes light dry snow, known as "cold smoke."

We'll fly to Bozeman, Montana, and after a 1 hour bus ride, arrive at Big Sky, Stillwater Condominiums are across the street from the ski lifts. 


# SCSC PARTICIPATES AT LOCAL SKI SHOWS/ SALES EVENTS


