





# July and Too Much Snow in the Swiss Alps!

What was the logical next step after George Hirasaki and Fred Kahrs went helicopter skiing in the Snake River Range and the pair along with Jim Dietrich climbed Mount Fredmont in the Wind River Range of Wyoming? The natural progression was to climb mountains with skis and schuss down. In May, the trio went to the Swiss Alps to try alpine ski mountaineering.

Alpine or cross country skis do not work well with this activity. Ski touring equipment, which is popular in Europe, allows one to walk uphill as with cross country skis but yet ski downhill as with alpine skis. This is made possible with "skins" that can be stuck on the bottom of the skis to prevent the skis from sliding backwards but allow them to slide forward. Also, the bindings can be unlocked so that the heels can lift when walking. Additional required equipment are crampons for walking uphill on ice when it becomes too steep for the skis and an ice axe to self-arrest a fall on steep ice. When walking on a glacier, everyone is belayed (roped) together in case someone falls into a hidden cavass. The final safety device is the "Peeper," a radio transmitter worn around your neck. If you get buried by an avalanche, it emits a peeping sound which the others use to locate you. Everyone not buried will turn their radio on receive and form a search line. The peeping is the loudest when closest to the victim. The searchers will crisscross the area until the victim is pinpointed. The snow shovel is then used to dig to the victim.


This is not an activity to enter into without proper conditioning. Jim works out by running six miles a day at the Houstonian. George runs the three miles around the Rice campus under twenty minutes. Fred, in addition to his long distance biking, works out at the Waist Basket, along with Peb Rock, Marty Matras, and Tania Andrasko.

Zermatt was reached by the bright red Glacier Express. The final leg was so steep, the train had cogs to keep from slipping back downhill. The trio stayed at the 130 year-old Post Hotel where they were greeted at 7:00 a.m. each morning by a cheerful Grichting Evelyne who served them breakfast. She was on the Swiss National Women's Ski Team for seven years until her knees gave out. Zermatt is at the base of the Matterhorn and the Italian border. Lunch was at Cervinia, Italy one day and at Rifugio, the Club Alpino Italiano mountain hut on another day. There were no crowds on the glaciers that are open for summer skiing. In fact, one morning the trio had to plow a path through the knee deep snow under the poma lift.

The trio trained with their touring equipment by walking several kilometers up the wind blown and crusted face of the Kline Matterhorn. At the height of the climb, Jim, who has skied only a few times, asked, "Now that I am up here, how do I get down?"

The starting point for the mountaineering tour was to be the Jungfraujock, which one reaches by cog train thrugh the Eiger. At a sidewalk restaurant in Grindwald, the trio con-

templated the Finsteraarhorn, a 4274 meter mountain on the itinerary. As the clouds parted, it could be seen behind the Eiger, all covered with snow except for the sheer cliffs which would not hold snow. After being silent for several minutes, Fred was asked if he was alright. He replied, "I don't know if I want to climb that thing." That mountain did command respect.

Fate did not permit climbing in the Swiss Alps. The Forn, the warm, moist air from the Mediterranean collided with the cold European air over the Swiss Alps and dumped nine feet of snow during the week before the tour. The guide, concerned with the extreme avalanche danger with the new snow, cancelled the tour.

# SCSC Community Relations.

Space City Ski Club should be very proud of its membership. Not only do we have many members who volunteer their time to make SCSC a huge success, but they improve the quality of life here in various charities. Many of SCSC members enthusiastically donate their time and skills to charities such as MDA, Houston Lifestock Show & Rodeo, PBS-Channel 8 and the Houston Farm & Ranch Club, among others. Let me tell you a little about the Houston Farm & Ranch Club, which many SCSC members are already actively involved in.

The Houston Farm & Ranch Club has a rich history of service to the community and its youth. Chartered in 1947, the Club's early membership raised funds through various activities for scholarships and support of youth programs. Private lands and ranches were opened to young people to work with animals and land.

More than 10 years ago, Houston Farm & Ranch Club members saw the need, in a growing and bustling Houston, to set aside an area and to build a facility for use by those of our youth who embrace the heritage of Texas.

Planning was begun and the Youth Center, on 123 acres of beautiful land in Bear Creek Park, will soon celebrate its fourth birthday as the operating unit of the Club that helps our young people preserve western values and culture.

The Youth Center at Bear Creek Park features a 2,500-seat show arena surrounded by warm-up areas, pavilions and teaching rooms. The Harris County Extension Service is currently building a facility at the Center for local offices and meeting rooms.

The facilities of the Club's Youth Center are made available for 4-H Clubs and FFA activities, the Sheriff's Junior Posse, the Sheriff's Drill Team, and Harris County Law Enforcement School and is the site of the annual Houston-Harris County Fair. Farm & Ranch Club members annually host a Children's Day at the Center for young people from M.D. Anderson Hospital, Harris County Home for the Retarded, Boys Country and Girls Country, the DePelchin Home and the Shriner's Hospital.

Club members entertain the youngsters with a rodeo, wagon rides, clown performances and "stick-to-the-ribs" food and refreshments. Youth clubs from distant cities, exhibiting at the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo, exercise their animals at the Center while waiting for space at the rodeo and show arena.

The Houston Farm & Ranch Club Youth Center is home for the Salt Grass Trail Ride, the oldest of the trail rides. The Salt Grass and Valley Lodge Trail Rides bivouac at the Youth Center prior to the Go Texas Day parade.



City Ski Club members for its support in the past and looks forward to the future.




Jim Ellis, F&R Team Captain, showing off his Farm & Ranch T-shirt at the recent Golf Tournament recently.

# Staying in Shape with SCSCers: Dance Fever by Lynn Danhauser and Harold Eaton

Whether you call it disco, swing, ballroom, country-western, or whip; dance fever has captured the hearts (not to mention the feet) of many SCSC'ers looking for ways to stay fit for ski season. Dance represents the essence of the free spirit, rhythmic movement using freely styled or carefully rehearsed motions, usually to music. One has to "feel" the beat of the music to capture the timing of the dance, to execute the turns, to glide smoothly across the floor, to make the dance come together. 
