COMMUNITY RELATIONS CORNER

First, I want to thank those of you who donated food and money at the Community Relations Table at our September meeting. We collected 75 lbs. of food and \$25.00 -- great first effort. For those of you who forgot or could not find us - we will be collecting at the October and subsequent meetings. All your support is greatly appreciated. We are a

vital part of this community as a club and as individuals!!

THE HOUSTON FOOD BANK

We usually associate hunger and malnutrition with Third World countries. Unfortunately, it exists in our own backyard. Requests for emergency food asistance in Houston increased 1,000 percent between 1983 and 1984. The Texas Department of Health recently documented over a three-year period 513 deaths, primarily among the elderly, due to malnutrition. The Houston Metropolitan Ministry's Meals on Wheels program found that 76 percent of those served reported that the one meal delivered each weekday was the only food they received.

Enough food to feed four million people three meals per day for any entire year is wasted in Texas annually. In Houston alone 1.5 million pounds is thrown away annually.

Food banking takes food that would otherwise be destroyed and

places it in the hands of people who are hungry. The Houston Food Bank is a private, non-profit corporation that serves as a clearinghouse through which local and national food companies can donate wholesome yet unsaleable food. This food is then redistributed to local charities that help the poor, hungry, and victims of crises. Companies such as Fiesta Mart, Inc., Grocers Supply Co., Orowheat Baking Co., Randall's Food Markets, Inc., Safeway Stores, Inc., and Schoenmann Produce Co. donated over 100,000 pounds of food in the Houston area. Bruce Springsteen and Kenny Rogers are some of the many individual supporters of The Food Bank and Second Harvest programs.

Drives such as the one the Club is working on brought more than 251,000 pounds of food to the Food Bank in 1984. The Food Bank needs:

Canned meats such as Tuna; Beans, Rice, Macaroni, Spaghetti; Canned Vegetables, Soups, Canned Fruit, Peanut Butter, Baby Formula

(Please no homemade items, or cans without labels.)

If carrying cans is not appealing, donations of cash are definitely welcome. The Food Bank can **distribute 25 pounds** of food for **just \$1.00.** That's a very efficient use of money. (With the \$25.00 collected at our first meeting, the Food Bank can distribute 625 lbs. of food.)





Texas Ski Council Update by Eric Holm, Council Representative

Recently questions have been raised about prices of trips being high and whether the Texas Ski Council is doing all it can to get the lowest prices. This is a complex issue with a number of factors contributing to the overall cost. More than just inflation has contributed to the cost of the trips.

This season airlines in general have not been receptive to working with groups. Also, a few years ago our members would fly to Denver, board a bus, and enjoy the camaradarie of a 4-5 hour bus ride to Aspen or Crested Butte and stay at condos that may or may not be slope side. In recent years, our members have indicated a preference for more comfort and convenience by choosing trips which fly directly into the ski area and offer luxury accommodations. This season we have tripled the demand for air into Aspen and Gunnison (Crested Butte) from 2 years ago and also booked luxury condos, some of which are ski-in and ski-out.

Price alone is not what determines if an area is awarded our business. Lowest bid is not always the most marketable. For example, other clubs may have difficulty selling a trip that SCSC might fill quickly. Several of the clubs don't have sufficient membership to support more than the two required TSC weeks. Therefore, they will

tend to vote for certain areas which they feel confident their members want to ski. Another factor is that some clubs may have had previous disappointing sales to a given area. Through the past years we

have usually been able to offer one TSC trip at below market prices, such as Sun Valley. This year's exceptional buy is Badgastein, Austria. These rates are due to the hard work of the TSC officers making ourselves known in other ski markets outside of Colorado and Utah. As we tell the ski world who we are and how many there are of us, we hope they will notice us enough to target their marketing at us. It is generally through their marketing fund that our trips are subsidized. The hope of course is that over a thousand Texas skiers will have a great time and each one of the participants will convince a few friends to come back to ski that area in the future. Call it an introductory offer if you will, but prices on Sun Valley the previous year and Badgastein this season are not expected to be repeated at these resorts.

I hope I have answered some of your questions in this article. As your TSC representative, I want to know what you, our members, think about our trips. Come by and see me at the monthy general meeting or call me at 591-7669 and let me know what you think.






