

CHOOSING YOUR PERSONAL SKIING PARADISE

Overheard in the trip table lines during the September meeting, "Where should I go skiing? I don't know which trip to choose." As your V. P. of Trips, I am asked this question a great deal, so I wrote this article to pass along some of my suggestions to those of you who may be undecided on your skiing plans. Most of the comments in this article are my personal opinion and are not intended to be the definitive answers on the subject of skiing. I will also limit my comments to those ski areas on this year's SCSC trip schedule.

Choosing a ski vacation is a highly personal endeavor depending on your preferences of skiing versus partying, lively versus quiet, plush versus modest, etc. My advice is to first define what time of the season you are available to go, how much expense you can afford, and how long (short vs. long trip) you can stay. These three criteria will probably narrow your choices considerably.

First, a few comments on money. Long trips cost more than short trips - that seems simple enough, however longer trips generally are better values because you can spread your transportation cost over more ski days. My nominee for best value is Copper II. You get all the parties, roses, and activities of the seven day trips for under \$400. The only thing you miss is one day of skiing. How many of you ski seven days on a trip anyway. The best value in the short trip category is Copper III. It's tough to beat those January Texas Ski Week prices.

Now on to more important things. Which ski area has the most men? The answer – Jackson Hole, no contest. Unfortunately, we're not running a trip there this season, therefore, I recommend that you try any SCSC trip, there should be plenty of men on all of them. Okay now, where do you go to find the ladies? Aspen or Vail are not bad bets, but I'll put my money on our own Space City groups, particularly those trips during school vacation such as Banff and Big Sky.

Some of you may base your choice on the type of skiing terrain available at the various areas. Are there any areas particularly well-suited for the beginner skier, for example. Don't worry, all the areas we visit have beginner and novice ter-

rain. Copper Mountain would be a good choice, not only is 30% of the mountain geared to beginners, but the trails are all in one easy to get to section of the mountain and far enough away from the expert areas so that you won't have to worry about dive bombing experts crossing your tracks. Sunshine Village (Banff) and Buttermilk Mountain (Aspen/Snowmass) also have a large area of terrain devoted to the newer skier.

For the intermediate skier, the choice has to be Snowmass. With over 1400 acres, 3500 vertical feet, well-groomed trails of which 65% are rated intermediate, Snowmass is a cruiser's paradise. Other notable nominations for large expanses of intermediate terrain are Park City, Vail, and Steamboat.

The experts among us will no doubt want to check out the steeps and bumps at Aspen Mountain, Taos or Mt. Mansfield at Stowe. For something different why not Heli-Skiing out of Banff or the Utah Interconnect (Park City).

Like to ski, but hate those chairlifts? A number of the areas we will ski this season are served by trams and gondolas including Stowe, Steamboat, Squaw Valley (Tahoe), Sunshine Village (Banff), Vail and Big Sky. Copper Mountain has a covered chair for those who prefer to ride in comfort.

You want a ski area that's lively and with lots of entertainment, we got it. Las Vegas (Brianhead), Tahoe, and New York (Stowe) should satisfy that urge. Other ski towns with lots of action are Aspen (where else?), Vail and Park City (don't let those Utah liquor laws fool you).

If uncrowded and quiet is more your style, I would normally recommend Big Sky, except this year when all us Texans disrupt the quiet for the final Texas Ski Week trip. If you detest lift lines, Brianhead and Stowe should be a delight.

The most interesting lodging award this year should go to the Banff Springs Hotel — if you ever wanted to stay in a Castle (complete with ghost), here's your chance. In the Casino category take your pick—Harvey's (Lake Tahoe) or the Imperial Palace (Ski Vegas).

If you are looking for a ski area with atmosphere and charm, Stowe, Vermont with its small town, steepled churches, and New England style should be your choice. Here, the condo ghettos of the Rockies are replaced by quaint inns and lodges. Taos is also a favorite where the Indian/Mexican decor of the desert town is sharply contrasted with the very European style of the ski area.

All the trips will have parties, of course. The most festive award goes to Banff. The holiday decorations, the ceremony at the Banff Springs and Chateau Lake Louise hotels and New Year's Eve should make this a memorable occasion. Taking the gondola to Thunderhead at Steamboat for a nighttime party should not be missed. One of the great bus parties promises to be the ride from Las Vegas to Brianhead – (Ski Vegas).

For fine food Aspen is hard to beat. Those of you on the Stowe trip should find more than enough variety in New York City. My on-the-mountain-cuisine award goes to Deer Valley (Park City) and the high Alpine Restaurant at Snowmass.

And finally, the best magic show — the Tower Bar at Snowmass. I have not completed my research of my favorite ski area bars yet, but you are welcome to join me this season.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The financial statements for the 1983-84 fiscal year of Space City Ski Club, Inc., are shown on the adjacent page of this Sitzmarke issue. Note that SCSC was able to show a profit of \$8,435.87 and increase its members' equity to \$38,534.10. Considering the \$4,427.75 bad debts expense taken in the 1982-83 fiscal year, the net incomes for the last two years compare favorably with each other. SCSC is a non-profit organization and does its best each year to keep expenses to a minimum. All profits realized are put to use by the club to negotiate attractive ski trip packages with firm dollar prices well before the club receives payment for these trips from the actual trip participants. Although the financial statements should be self-explanatory, a few remarks will be made regarding the ski trips as well as the non-ski trips and activities.

Ski Trips. Ski trips for the

1983-84 fiscal year showed a total net loss of \$483.39. This loss. however, resulted from SCSC issuing refunds totaling \$4,544.04 to 335 trip participants on 8 of the 14 ski trips, namely, Sun Valley IA, Sun Valley IB, Sun Valley II, Crested Butte. Telluride, Jackson Hole, Heavenly Valley I, and Heavenly Valley II. SCSC's Executive Committee authorized refunds to be issued for all trips which showed a final net balance of \$10.00 or more per participant. The actual refunds ranged from \$11.24 to \$21.26 per participant.


Non-ski Trips and Activities.

Non-ski trips and activities for the 1983-84 fiscal year showed a total net profit of \$2,279.99. Approximately half of this amount was made on the Casino Party. Planning for this activity is always difficult, since many people frequently choose to show up at the door rather than sign up in advance. As a result, SCSC

usually ends up making a profit on this activity. In addition, one of this year's door prize winners was unable to go on a SCSC ski trip this year. Thus, one prize of a \$500.00 ski trip allowance went unused and contributed to the large profit. The other half of the total profit on the non-ski trips and activities came from the various other activities held during the year. As in the case of ski trips, refunds are not made if the profit on the activity is less than \$10.00 per participant.

In summary, the 1983-84 fiscal year was a good one for SCSC. The 1983-84 officers should be commended for streamlining their operating expenses during the year and enabling SCSC to show a healthy profit. I enjoyed serving SCSC as your Treasurer last year and appreciated the cooperation I received from the entire SCSC membership.


