

SEPTEMBER SIGN-UP

The beginning of Ski Season in September? Time flies when you're having a good time. After a full summer of preparation, negotiation, budget meetings, and TC/ATC orientation meetings, our trips are ready to sell.

The slate of trips is designed to appeal to a variety of tastes and pocketbooks. The trip costs and descriptions are included in this edition. Be sure to consult the chart prior to the September Sign-Up Meeting and decide where you're going before you arrive at the meeting.

The TOP Trips (Trips of Opportunity) scheduled for early December and early January will be represented at a table, but will only have a sign-up sheet to show your interest. There will be no deposit. The trips will go only if we can get bargain air fares and lodging which normally begin to appear after Labor Day. Be sure to sign the info sheets if you are interested. Contact either of the DOTS or myself if you have questions.

Sign-up will be conducted as follows:

- Trip tables will be set up by each Trip Coordinator.
- 2. You may sign-up

yourself and one other person for that trip.

- A deposit of \$75 is required for each participant except for the Europe trip which requires a \$300 deposit. Personal checks will be accepted. The Europe trip also has a different cancellation and transfer policy than domestic trips. Ask the TC for details.
- Show your membership card and put number on Release Form. If you sign up another person they must be members of SCSC to go on trips so also have their member number available.
- 5. If you ask to be put on the wait list, a deposit check must be given to the TC. If the trip does not fill at that meeting, you will be called and either put on as a participant or taken off the wait list.
- The SCSC standing rules which cover trip procedures will be in full effect.

Skiing is just one of the many attractions a person finds at a winter resort. Ranking very high on priority, especially with SCSCers, is the night life. Whether it's night skiing, an elegant restaurant or a local bar that turns you on, somewhere in the Rockies there is one that has been deemed the best. Read on and see if you agree.

Best hospitality - While almost every resort works hard to emphasize service, there's one that stands out for good, old down-home conviviality. All those cowboy hats at Steamboat are for more than just show. And the howdy's are for real, too.

Best lodge - A new state-of-the art lodge comes along at least once a year in the Rockies. This season it's the Snowmass Club. The ratings people have been saving up stars for this one. The top contender, however, would have to be The Westin Vail. Two champions from earlier years, the Keystone Lodge and Beaver Run at Breckenridge, still get high marks.

Best athletic club - Prospector Square at Park City has four racquetball courts, an indoor pool and all the trimmings. It may not seem quite proper, but you can also work up a sweat amid the luxury of the Snowmass Club. Doesn't anybody ski anymore?

Best night skiing - The entire front side of Eldora, one of the little

Best elegant dining - They've refurbished the historic Lodge at Sun Valley with chandeliers from Milan, silk wall coverings and blondoak accoutrements. It was designed to showcase the early Hollywood set, and each diner is given a grand entrance upon arrival. If cuisine is your primary interest, the Chalet St. Bernard at Taos is the choice. You'll have to leave the Rockies to eat better.

Best meeting place - O. K., let's get down to the nitty gritty....all the beautiful people in Aspen, which is quite a few, flock to Little Nell's at the base of Ajax as soon as the lifts close, whether they own a pair of skis or not.

Best local bar - The Jerome at Aspen, the Wooden Nickel at Crested Butte, the Tugboat at Steamboat, the Cowboy Bar at Park City, the Sheridan at Telluride. The list goes on, but try these. If you can't soak up a little flavor along with your suds, you had best turn in your I. D. card.

Best resort to pick up men - - Jackson Hole, Alta, Snowbird, Telluride. The ratio runs as high as 10 to 1, but these macho types will hustle you in over your heads in more than deep powder snow. Try Vail if your're looking for Mr. Right.
