## SCSC MEMBER SURVEY RESULTS

## by Sy Liebergot

At long last the majority of the survey results are ready for publication. More than 1000 of you, representing an $83 \%$ response to the questionnaire, created an incredible 180,000 individual answers to be compiled. Most (89\%) joined SCSC primarily for skiing, with social reasons a significant second, but the majority of you involve SCSC in $25 \%$ or less of your social activities.


TRIPS - 37\% of all available vacation days are spent skiing, with an almost even split of ski trips with and not with SCSC.

- The majority of respondents answered that SCSC should not offer a ski trip to include dependent minors.

Members prefer 7-day trips and overwhelmingly during non-holiday periods.

We are decidedly intermediate/advanced intermediate skiers, half of whom have never raced NASTAR and want a race team.

OTHER INTERESTS - SPORTS - Tennis is the big favorite, while bowling is not; one individual reported that "spending my money" was sporting.

NON-SPORTS interests ran the gamut and included metaphysics, sex, women, dancing, drinking, men, and "anything" as well as "everything."


New activities/trips recommendation highlights were Mexico and a cruise.

VITAL STATISTICS - Three-fourths of the club is single with $10 \%$ more single females than single males. About 72\% of the members live in Southwest Houston, $18 \%$ in Northwest, and 9\% East/Southeast. These facts should be considered when discussing future meeting places.

We are 30-39 years of age, with a salary range of $\$ 20,000$ to $\$ 50,000+$.

## STANDING RULES CHANGES

At the November Board of Directors meeting the following changes in the Standing Rules were voted into effect immediately:
4.0 DEFINITIONS
4.1 TRIP - An SCSC pre-planned function that includes at least one night's lodging and normally transportation. As such, a trip is subject to the restrictions and penalties specified in Sections 5.0, 7.0 and 8.0 of the Standing Rules.
4.2 ACTIVITY - An SCSC pre-planned function that does not involve lodging arrangements. As such, an activity is subject to the restrictions and penalties specified in Sections 6.0, 7.0 and 8.0 of the Standing Rules.
6.0 ACTIVITY PENALTIES
6.1 Price of each activity shall be approved by the Executive Committee.
6.2 Those activities allowing "payment at the door" shall charge price plus 40 percent at the door, up to a maximum of $\$ 10$ over price.
6.3 CANCELLATION FEES
A. Activities priced at $\$ 10$ or less - no refund
B. Activities priced at more than $\$ 10$

1. Refund shall be price less $\$ 10$
2. To receive refund, activity coordinator must receive written notification prior to final payment date or seven days before said activity, whichever is earlier.

# CRESTED BUTTE OFFERS SKIING LIKE IT USED TO BE 

"Locals like to brag that Crested Butte offers skiing like it used to be....short lift lines, a mountain capacity that's still ahead of lodging and plenty of good skiing, whether you're an expert or a rank beginner."

The above quote is taken from the October issue of Houston Home and Garden Magazine, an authoritative ski journal, if there ever was one. And, it's true.

While this area is gaining in popularity, the mountain is able to comfortably accommodate the crowds. New lifts in operation this year will expand the area and increase the balance of trails among beginner, intermediate and advanced skiers.

At the same time, the village and basin establishments are growing to meet the entertainment demands. Several new gourmet restaurants have opened with rave reviews. Importantly, there are very few resorts left where a lift ticket is yours for \$13.50.

The logistics, after much juggling, are really pretty good. We leave via Delta early Saturday morning February 11 for Montrose, Colo. The bus ride is only 75 miles and we
should be able to ski half a day. The return is the following Saturday, February 18, with a flight that will get us home at a reasonable hour. That will give everyone a full day to relax before resuming work.

The Chateau condos are all two bedrooms with two baths with fireplaces and balconies. The walk to the lifts is short and downhill, or if you prefer, a shuttle makes the rounds every 20 minutes.

Ski rentals are nearby as are shops, groceries, bars and other necessities. After skiing, treat yourself to a swim in a heated, covered pool or unwind at one of several trip cocktail parties.

If all of the above were not
enough, this is also the setting for the Winter Shoot Out, the Texas Ski Council's big deal down the mountain....eatout, drinkout and skiout.

Whether or not you believe in a free lunch, this trip has a bundle of freebees and cheapies as well as the opportunity for you to help SCSC recapture the coveted Texas Ski Cup.

## TSC ADAPTS NEW FORMAT FOR TEXAS SKI CUP

The Texas Ski Council (TSC) has changed the format for winning the Texas Ski Cup. This trophy is now awarded for the best club performance over the entire season and a new scoring system has been approved.

The new system developed out of a growing concern amongst TSC clubs that the trophy was being monopolized by the club with the most participants. (Some folks call this sour grapes!) Indeed, history shows that only four clubs have won the Texas Ski Cup....Texas A\&M once, SnoMad Ski Club once, University of Texas three times and SCSC five times.

So, we have dominated the competition until UT got serious. The new system was devised by a committee headed by Easy Thayer. The committee's objective was twofold....to still encourage participation and, theoretically, allow all clubs the chance to win.

So, boys and girls, get out your slide rule or calculators and a large pad of paper and an attempt will be made to explain the new system.

There will be a Texas Ski Cup race at each TSC trip....Keystone, Sun Valley, Crested Butte, Heavenly Valley and Breckenridge. Points will
be awarded to each finishing racer based on the expanded NASTAR grid just as they have been for the past four years.

Trophies will be awarded to the club with the most points at each event, just as last year. The Texas Ski Cup will be awarded to the club with the highest point total at the end of the year, using the following formula:

The total points for each club will be divided by the total participants from each club and multiplied by the number of TSC trips that club went on. Participants are all folks on the trip, not just those who race.

This format encourages race participation by everyone on the trip because they will figure in the outcome anyway. It also encourages a club to support and go on all TSC sponsored events and will reward clubs that do.

Over the years SCSC has been the best supporter of TSC events. The average points per participant factor should, theoretically, allow more clubs the chance to win.

Easy will be happy to answer any questions concerning the Texas Ski Cup competition, but if you have any complaints, direct them to

So, if you sign up for a TSC trip, please sharpen your edges and enter the race. Every point earned is important and the rest of the club will be counting on you. UT is out of the running this year, so here is our chance to recapture the Texas Ski Cup.
