



- (8) U.S. Ski Area Closest to a Major City?
- (9) Longest U.S. Ski Tram System?
- (10) Longest Ski Season in the Rockies?
- (11) Northernmost Ski Area in the Rockies?
- (12) Southernmost Ski Area in the Rockies?

ANSWERS:

- (1) Sun Valley, Idaho. Founded in 1936 by the Union Pacific Railroad, Sun Valley was started in order to give the railroad more wintertime business. Land for the area was bought in the spring; construction was finished before Christmas. The Union Pacific provided labor.
- (2) Jackson Hole, Wyoming. Jackson Hole, part of the Tetons, has a drop of 4139 feet from its highest point.
- (3) Red River Woodlands, New Mexico. This beginner area adjacent to the larger Red River has a vertical drop of only 100 feet.
- (4) Vail, Colorado. Vail Mountain has ten square miles of slopes.
- (5) Park City, Utah. Payday, an intermediate run, is lighted for 1.25 miles.
- (6) Sun Valley, Idaho, The lift at Proctor Mountain was designed by a Union Pacific engineer who based his concept on equipment used to unload bananas from railroad cars. The chair, built in 1936, is still in operation but is rarely used.
- (7) Keystone, Colorado. Keystone's Arapaho Basin is 12,440 feet above sea level at its summit.

OFFICE OF SECRETARY

The office of secretary would appear relatively simple to the average ski club member. She/he takes minutes at the general meeting and is available to answer questions of the membership, just like any other officer. This is just the beginning.

The secretary's main work is done in the summer, just like every other officer's. Every form you see and/or fill out for trips and activities is provided by the secretary of the Club. She orders additional forms, revises forms, and distributes them. With a 1400 person membership, this is a lot of paper when you consider trip release forms are signed for nearly every function. Each Trip Chairman must have a supply of each of the various forms which are used (transmittals, trip transfer forms, stationery).

The secretary is also in charge of the pins, patches and decals. She must inventory this when she takes office and order additional items to keep "the store" in operation. She finds a volunteer to handle sales and inventory during the year, but she must make sure the items are available at the meetings and that there are volunteers lined up for each meeting, and ski trip, to sell these.

Before the club began meeting at the Racquet Club, the secretary was responsible for the drink ticket tables. She provided the tickets and found the volunteers to sell the tickets at the monthly general meetings. At the end of the meetings she had to reconcile the drink ticket money and turn it over to the treasurer. The Lift-Liners also are a responsibility of the secretary. She calls

volunteers before each general meeting to line up the Lift-Liners for that month's meeting.

Throughout the year, from May to May, the secretary takes minutes of every executive committee meeting (once a month), general meeting (once a month), and Board of Directors meeting (every three months or when called). These minutes must be written up and distributed to all members of the Board and executive committee in advance of the next meeting. The secretary must notify the Board and executive committee of each of these meetings (except the general meeting) and arrange for the meeting place and refreshments.

Space City's post office box is located at the Timmons station. The secretary checks this box about twice a week and distributes the mail to the proper people. She warehouses all the records of the club, including a copy of the club's Articles of Incorporation, past minutes, stationery, forms and the surplus pins, patches, etc. The name badges that are worn by the officers, board members, trip chairmen, directors, and assistants are also provided by

the secretary.

The directory of SCSC is compiled by the secretary. She coordinates the picture taking for the directory and works with the publisher in putting it together. Picking the cover is about the most fun part of this duty. In line with the record keeping duties of the secretary, she has to be **sure** the By-Laws and Standing Rules that appear in the directory are current. (She provides the executive committee and Board of Directors with updated copies of these as they are amended during the year).

All in all, the secretarial duties of SCSC are much like any corporate secretarial position. The busiest time of

the year for the SCSC secretary is summer as is every other officer's in this club and by the end of September, everything is under control if the snowfall cooperates. She takes dictation (from the other officers and Board members) at the meetings, types the minutes and distributes them, handles any necessary correspondence, keeps the records, and keeps the communication lines open between all the officers. So, as you can now see, a lot goes on behind the scenes for the secretary of SCSC and this can also be said for every officer of this club. SCSC is a business and the secretary has many bosses - the members of SCSC.





Packing For Travel Ease and Skiing Pleasure

New to the club?
Going on your first ski trip?
Know what you need to take?

Do you need to take as much as this poor guy? Believe me, if you do, you'll look about like he does after your second time of loading and unloading your luggage. Remember, you will be carrying your OWN luggage and ski equipment from: (1) your parking at the airport to the inside of the terminal(you may use a porter here, but DO NOT have him check your luggage through for you! Most trips will have special group tags for your luggage and equipment and everyone's will be loaded at once.) (2) the Denver or other airport luggage claim outside to the bus (3) the bus to your condo which may be up several flights of stairs at the opposite end of the unloading circle (4) the whole routine over again on return. In order to avoid making two or three trips carrying all of this to and from, try to pack as conservatively as possible. The check list which has been used by SCSC for several years is an excellent guide to follow:

If you can't get all the above in one suitcase, leave something at home.

REMEMBER to carry your Parka, it will be cold when you arrive at the ski area.

Some additional helpful hints - especially for the first timers:

- you may want to rent your equipment at the resort so you won't have the hassle of carrying your equipment until you see what skiing is all about.
- if you do carry skis and boots and have the carrying bags for them, stuff these with socks, underwear and other non-crushable clothing to save more room in your suitcase.
- try to line-up your roommate before your trip and see if you can't combine some items: hair dryer, hot rollers, travel iron, etc.
- ladies, think about leaving your purse at home. You probably won't be needing all the stuff you usually have in it for this one week. When you go out at night, all you'll need is a small billfold for money and charge cards, lipstick, compact and comb. These fit very nicely into zip up ski jacket pockets. See? Unless your TC or ATC tell you differently, assume that your condo will have 4-6 people in it with two people per bath. Condos will vary considerably in the arrangement of beds and rooms. There may be one room with a double or queen bed, one with twin beds and a fold-out couch in the living room. Most condos have kitchens and fireplaces with the kitchens being well enough equipped to fix a pot of coffee and cook a breakfast. You and your roommates may want to combine efforts in a run to the grocery after your arrival for a week's worth of coffee, breakfast items and fire starter. Don't forget your bathing suit since most resorts offer access to jacuzzis and pools.

After you have your things packed, stand back and re-evaluate your bags. Can you comfortably handle them yourself? Is there anything you can leave behind? Most people find that they take too many clothes. Washers and dryers can be found if you run out of something. Dress comfortably! This is not a style show week and ski areas welcome people dressed in jeans and sweaters at night.

Try to attend your pre-trip party since specific information is discussed for the trip. If you have any questions, call your TC or ATC for any details you need.
