

PARKING: Just think! Plenty of spaces, and covered, too. There is VERY RARELY anything going on in the Summit on Monday nights (*you've notices we've switched from Wednesdays to Mondays, right?*) Therefore, the entire Greenway Plaza underground parking is available to Space City! And no big crowds or traffic as we enter or leave!

HOW TO ENTER THE PARKING AREA

- *Easiest Procedure Via Edloe* turn into hotel drive entrance, pass lobby door, follow circular ramp down into the GREEN hotel parking area.
- Via Southwest Freeway access road use Buffalo Speedway exit (from either direction on freeway) - parking entrance is just before the Edloe Street overpass.
- Via Richmond use parking entrance nearest Edloe.

WHERE TO PARK

- There are three levels of parking in the underground -The Concourse level (top), B-1 level, and B-2 level (lowest).
- Best Parking "GREEN" Hotel Guest parking area (Level B-1).
- Other Parking "CONTRACT ONLY" areas IF after normal business hours.
- Levels B-1 or B-2 NOT the Concourse level. (Most areas have parking gates.)

IF YOU ENTER A PARKING GATE THAT DISPENSES A TICKET

- Green Ticket take ticket up to the hotel lobby desk, where it may be exchanged for a free token. Efforts will be made to have entrance gates to GREEN areas up on the Monday evenings of our meetings.
- Ticket Color Other Than Green You might have to pay to get out of these areas if you leave the meeting early. If you stay at the meeting until after 10:00 p.m., you may not have to pay anything as all the gates to the parking areas are usually raised by then.

ENTERING THE HOTEL

- The lobby of Stouffer's is on the main above ground level and the ballrooms are on the Concourse level, which is connected to the next lower level (B-1 parking) via an escalator.
- Once you have parked, look for the entrance to Stouffer's and make a mental note of where you left your car (remember, a lot can happen to you in the next few hours!).
- From Level B-2 you must take stairs up to Level B-1.
- From Level B-1 the hotel has an escalator up to the Concourse level, where the ballrooms are found.

So, we'll see you September 13th! Come prepared for fun, conversation and to sign up for those ski trips!



What Skiing Means

If a survey were taken among the club's fourteen hundred or so members, there would be fourteen hundred specific reasons for involvement in skiing and ski-related activities. Now, as we begin yet another season of ski trips, parties, handicap races, and stein lifts, as well as ski lifts, it might be a good time to assess your own personal reasons for spending hundreds, or even thousands, of dollars on this purely trivial recreation.

For myself, skiing has been an onagain, off-again part of my life since I first strapped wooden skis to my body when I was an eager ten-year-old on the hills of Maine. My reason for skiing then, despite aching feet, bitter cold, and hand burns from the rope tow, was that it was fun. After all, how many ten-year-olds ask why they ski? They simply do it. I distinctly remember my first pair of leather ski boots when I was thirteen. They had an odd-looking square toe to fit into something called ski clamps (now known as bindings). Those were days of high technology, and anyone with Frankenstein-style boots and metal clamps especially designed for skiing was one step from being world class.


In the far too many intervening years to recount, skiing has taken on many guises to this aging slope dweller. In college and the several years thereafter, basic economics dictated I give up skiing while such essentials as sports cars, flying lessons, a fourbedroom home, and table-stakes poker could be dispensed with. But, on a business trip to Flagstaff, Arizona, in 1965, I took along my old ski pants. woolen socks, and long underwear knowing that tiny town had a ski slope nearby. Breaking away from a group of space engineers for an afternoon. the toughest part of getting back on the slopes again was getting into the ski pants. I rented skis and boots, of course, but dispensed with the poles, much to the chagrin of the ski-shop attendant, because such had always been deemed an unnecessary luxury when I grew up in Maine. Despite some spectacular gyrations on one ski. I never fell once that afternoon and was



securely hooked again on this amazing sport we call snow skiing.

Since then, I have joined, as have you, a group organized and dedicated to bringing this sport to the flatlanders of Houston, purchased a spot of land of my own in the mountains, built a skiing retreat with my bare hands, and gone on trips to Colorado, Lake Tahoe, Ruidoso, and New Hampshire at every opportunity. The values incumbent in pursuing this treacherous sport have changed vastly as age bores on with time, but the reasons are probably more valid than ever. Snow skiing is truly a unique sport, and I would group most of the reasons people participate in it into three general categories: *freedom*, *camaraderie*, and *personal growth*. The categories, as will be seen overlap somewhat.

A sense of *freedom* is a rapidly dying art in our crowded, urbanized society. Men and ladies turn to sailboats, motorcycles, hang-gliding, cabins in the woods, and nude beaches in search of that mind-state called freedom. Skiing provides us with it abundantly in terms of raw speed, danger, exploring (on occasions unintentionally) uncharted wilderness, and being left solely to our own devices to save our necks. When the only thing between living and dying is a pair of thin, narrow, plastic strips barely longer than one is tall, it is indeed our own fault if we fail to survive and thus derive a keen sense of excitement and total freedom. isn't the risk, and on motorcycles, we all know the odds are far better someone else will get us before we get ourselves. For me, the sheer joy of flying is the only thing that approaches skiing in terms of providing this sense of freedom. However, take a wrong turn in an airplane and the odds are good there's an airport, or at least a mowed pasture, below; take a wrong turn on some slopes, and the entire Russian army couldn't find you. Oh, for the thrill of hitting fifty or sixty miles an hour and trying desperately to remember what the instructor said about shifting one's weight before that tree does it for us. That's freedom!

Now for camaraderie. It's such a beautiful world borrowed from Jean Claude Killy and his French comrades. Webster says it means "loyalty and warm, friendly feeling among comrades." Loyalty might be debated at times, but who can dismiss the importance of the warmth and social sharing one always gets on a ski trip? From the bone-crushing maneuvering at the airline gate for "just the right seat on the plane" to the inebriety of the posttrip party. Get a bunch of young (well, fairly young), healthy, fun-loving souls away from the rigors of the workaday world, place them in the middle of majestic alpine beauty and you have all the ingredients for instant camaraderie. People who have despised one another for years suddenly become bosom buddies, and for more reasons than that. It's like fighting a military battle together, because we all valiantly attack those pristine slopes that first morning together and revel long into the wee hours of the ensuing morning at being alive and ambulatory at day's end.

And it only gets better. Give someone a week of daily such onslaughts, or better yet a ski trophy, and that person becomes a pro at camaraderie. Before leaving this all-too-important aspect of skiing. I must mention that one-of-akind arena of social contact, the lift line (why else are the club's social pros called "Liftliners?"). For it is in those incessant lift lines that we first meet humans as dedicated to this crazy sport as we are but who are *not* a familiar face. Instant friends who may hate the fact that Texans overrun the slopes from November to April but ultimately

succumb to our sheer enthusiasm, vast ingenuity, apparent wealth, and downright sex appeal. Some of the best friendships we'll ever have are made on the seven-or-so-minute climb up the hill in a tiny, two-person chair. yes, that's camaraderie, too!

Now for personal development. When I first mentioned that, I could just hear the winces of those who abhor self-help books, leisure courses, and regimented exercise programs. I simply didn't have a better term for the following: getting and keeping the old body in reasonable shape, seeking and finding new vistas of mountain beauty, and meeting new friends or expanding our relationships with old ones, not to mention a business contact or two. However you look at it, that's personal development, simply because we are better people when we return to the mundane four walls that encapsulate us the rest of the year. Our aching bodies tell us so, our memories and photos of those beautiful mountains and all that lovely powder constantly remind us, and our new-found friends won't let us forget under any circumstances (thank God!). We have grown on dimensions not available in the concrete confines of Houston, and, like it or not, we become people with a greater sense of humanity when we come home from a ski trip.

As as serious student of the most esoteric, I must also include in personal development the emotional growth one experiences from the new excitements of a skiing adventure. All of us learn, albeit unfortunately, to control our emotions as we "grow up" so we can get along in a "civilized, structured" world of enterprise and manners. We all too often lose the ability we had as a child to run, play, scream, indulge, and just generally "get down" and "get dirty." Polite society doesn't accept such goings-on. Well, for those few uninitiated readers, a ski trip corrects all that. It's pure unadulterated fun, and about the worst you can get out of it is a plaster cast, which is signed by thousands (get it? a cast of thousands!). One certainly cannot dismiss the rare opportunity for emotional development skiing has to offer.

There you have it. Three broad but pertinent reasons for taking to the slopes en masse. I ski for all three reasons, and generally in the order I have discussed them. You may have different ones, and that's okay. The important thing is to wait in line this September, put down your hardearned cash, and then dream during the ensuing weeks and months until that day arrives when you, too, can send your luggage to St. Louis while your body is deposited in Grand Junction because of bad weather in Denver. Instead of managing an Oscar-winning tirade against not only the airline and your smiling trip chairperson, but all of humanity, you will instantly realize you are there for all the positive reasons you've carefully chosen and you'll begin to *enjoy* all that adversity. You see, the now-lengthened, all-night bus trip to the slopes, Bloody Marvs until your bone marrow atrophies, and strains of "Edelweiss" until you hate Julie Andrews (aka Mary Poppins) for the first time ever are all a part of that. And who says you can't ski drunk in street clothes without any sleep? That's true freedom ... camaraderie for sure ... and if it's not personal growth, then you were passed out the whole time!




STANDING RULES FOR TRIPS


The following is a reprint of a portion of the trip release form you must sign in order to go on a Space City Ski Club trip. READ AND REMEMBER!

IV. TRIPS (SUMMER AND WINTER)

- A. No travel agencies shall be used on domestic trips with the exception that travel agencies may be allowed to write and deliver tickets.
- B. Trips should be budgeted to include only direct costs of the trips, including travel expenses of the Trip Chairperson and Assistant Chairperson.
- C. The Vice President-Trips shall provide the Directors of Trips and the Trip Chairpersons guidelines for trip management, to which the Trip Chairpersons shall adhere as closely as possible.
- D. If a trip participant withdraws from a trip after the specified final payment date, the trip participant will lose his entire payment unless he or she can be replaced from the waiting list or the Trip Chairperson is able to recover some or all of the participant's cost by cancellation of lodging, transportation, and/or other commitments. The trip participant will be entitled to the entire amount recovered by replacement or cancellation of arrangements less the cancellation fee stipulated in Section IV.G (below) and any extra expenses incurred by the Club in cancelling any of the previously made arrangements. The trip showing a profit or loss will not be a factor in determining the exact refund due. Also, if the Trip Chairperson failed to exercise a reasonable effort in cancelling accommodations or finding a replacement, the Executive Committee will award the appropriate refund, less the cancellation fee.
- E. Non-trip participants shall not be allowed to occupy any room as a non-registered guest.
 F. No substitutions shall be allowed without the knowledge and approval of the Trip Chairperson, and new additions to the trip shall come from the ''Wait List''. The Trip Chairperson shall make all substitutions.
- G. (1) A participant may forfeit his full deposit if he fails to notify the Club, in writing, of his intent to cancel prior to the published final payment dates. A minimum charge of \$10 will be assessed for each trip cancellation, and such charge will be increased by \$5 per month for each additional calendar month or portion thereof the participant's reservation is held prior to cancellation in writing delivered to the Club; the cancellation fee, however, may not exceed the amount of the trip deposit.
 (2) A participant cancelling from more than one trip shall be charged \$25 in addition to the calculated cancellation fee for each cancellation.
- H. A charge of \$5.00 will be assessed for each trip transfer.
- I. If a trip should be "weathered-in" the additional lodging expense will be left up to the invididual, although the Trip Chairperson will assist in making accommodation arrangements, and collection for same will be left up to the lodge.
