
With all our thoughts geared to ski-

The Office of Vice-President - Membership

** Editor's note: This is the first in a series of articles describing the various aspects of each office. It is hoped that SCSC members will be better informed of the workings of the club after each office has been covered.

Can anyone other than a past or present membership officer describe all of the duties of this office? The membership officer will be the first to tell you it is a demanding post to hold -especially during the summer months when all renewals are coming in. During June, July and August, renewals are taken from the previous 1400 members. During this same time, new member applications are taken and numbered in sequence as they arrive. Many of these have been held from the previous year when the membership filled. After the August 1 deadline for renewals, new member applicants are given membership numbers from vacancies. All checks from renewals and new members have to be listed individually on an income transmittal form and turned in frequently to the treasurer for deposit.

Shirley Andries describes the job as needing a "V.P. of Membership who is a very organized person." Work on applications can be done with a little work each day or it can really add up to a lot of work once a week.

Once the membership has filled, a waiting list is made of potential members and held until the following year. This, obviously, takes a lot of time during these summer months, but September is not where the job ends. The V.P. of Membership is continually taking name, address and phone changes for the computer print-outs. In this mobile society, that alone is not an easy task. In addition, before each meeting, volunteers must be contacted to work at the check-in table and as door guards. When interviewed about her past office, Tiny Aitken admitted that getting people to work was sometimes difficult and she had the tendency to call on friends or those same few people who had proven themselves dependable. Sy Liebergot also agreed, adding that one of the most important things is the volunteer list provided each officer. This list provides the "biggest opportunity to use new members". However, he found that he usually had to call people more than one time in order to get them to work and one can get easily discouraged having to do this each month.

Another role this officer plays is checking each trip participant list to be sure that all people on each trip are SCSC members or a member of a Texas Ski Council Club.

Use of a computer has been increasing each year. Tiny remembers manually writing out each membership card and sorting them into zip codes for the September mailing. This is now done by a computer. Marty Matras sees the full untilization of the computer information generated by membership applications - e.g. volunteer list, etc. - as a very important task of each officer. Therefore, complete sorting of all information by the computer is extremely valuable.

Jan Livingston is working with extending the use of the computer by separating spouses' work numbers for the directory. Also, she is gathering information for the computer as to who went on what trip so that this will be available for review for the "one trip every two years" by-law on membership eligibility. In addition, each month the computer prints out, by zip code order, the mailing labels for the SitzMarke with any new address changes that have been submitted to Jan. She also picks up the mail at the Club's P.O. box and distributes this into its proper channel.

With all of these various jobs rolled into one very large responsibility, the V.P.-Membership most likely also has a regular full-time job. When all is said and done, the person who is V.P.-Membership must be a dedicated SCSC'er who is willing to devote a lot of time and effort to this office.

Between watching the Oilers/Seattle game, mowing the grass, and explaining the remodeling plans for her house in Oak Forest she recently bought, **Penny Chancey** (a true native Houstonian--born downtown at St. Joseph's and raised within the city limits) described her life as a Houston "city girl".

In her grammar school years, our auburn-haired, hazel gray-eyed school teacher competed in the Gulf Area AAU Track & Field Meets, winning state medals in the 220 relay, the softball throw, and the broad jump! 

Aside from the rodeo goat roping contests (calves were too big for girls) and calf chasing where she competed by grabbing a ribbon from a calf's tail, the college rowdies celebrated with "prairie parties" by congregating in one of the local rice fields, drinking Falstaff and Jax's Beer.

Completing her education at Southwestern in San Marcos, Penny taught in HISD for 4 years, then transferred to the Cy-Fair School District where she's taught at Bane Elementary for 6 years. (She tried the office routine last year and decided she preferred teaching). She teaches second grade social studies and art in the mornings plus second and third grade math in the afternoons, in an open-concept school, which she prefers over the self-contained.



DEAR DR.:

Dear Dr.:

Every year when I go skiing, my nose becomes very dry and bleeds slightly. Is there anything I can do to prevent this from happening?

Prevent? - no - but you can ease the discomfort by trying to add moisture to your condo before you go to bed by taking a shower with the door open to allow moisture into the room, hold a damp washcloth over your nose for awhile; or, if it is really bothersome, take a humidifier with you. DO NOT use a decongestant nose spray, as this will just add to the dryness. There is a saline solution nose spray available that could be used. If your nose is stuffy, take a combination antihistimine/decongestant tablet during daytime and a long-acting antihistimine at night. (Antihistimines tend to make some people drowsy while decongestants may keep some awake.) This is a minor irritation that many people experience. Just remember to carry lots of kleenex with you!

Dear Dr.:

If I have a slight injury to my ankle or knee - one that does not require medical attention, but still hurts - what should I do? Apply hot or cold compresses to the injured area?

Remember this formula - ICE - Ice, Compression, (Ace bandage), Elevation. DO NOT take your foot out of your boot on the slope if you have injured your ankle! The boot is acting as the compression you need. When you return to your condo, apply ice packs for the first 24-48 hours, bandage with an Ace bandage and elevate the injured area. If it feels good enough to return skiing in a day or two, DO NOT use the bandage and then put your boot on. The uneven pressure of the bandage where it overlaps will create pressure points and may make pressure sores and rub blisters. If you re-injure it or it continues to bother you, seek medical attention.




