Breckenridge

February 21 - 28, 1981 \$399

On Saturday morning, February 21, 40 bright-eyed SCSC skiers will leave Intercontinental Airport for Denver. The group will start the week of partying and skiing with the short bus ride to Breckenridge. We will arrive early enough for all the die-hard skiers to hit the slopes for a half day of skiing.

Accomodations will be at the brand new Beaver Run Condominiums, with Peak 9 chairlift in our own backyard. All of the luxurious four-bedroom, four-bath units are completely furnished and the condos offer courtesy

vans, hot tubs, saunas, nautilus exercise equipment, ski shop, and equipment rental. The condos are located in walking distance of many fine restaurants in town. Shuttle buses are also available in town that will take skiers to Copper Mountain, Keystone and A-Basin. The same lift tickets will be honored on all the Mountains.

Several parties are planned during our 8 days of skiing. We will return to Houston on Saturday, February 28 in the late evening. The cost is only \$399 and final payment date will be January 7.

Banff, Canada

March 7 - 14, 1981 \$579

On March 7, forty urban cowboys and girls will board an aluminum Texas Eagle operated by Continental and called flight 773, leaving the north forty at 10:59 a.m. and returning on the 14th at 9:59 p.m. Destination: Canada and one of the most beautiful ski resorts in far north Texas — BANFF.

As the fancy stagecoach ends its short eighty mile gallop from Calgary, as many eyebrows will rise at the splendor of Mt. Norquay. Overlooking the little mining town of Banff, Mt. Norquay offers experts some of the steepest slopes in the area and challenges intermediates, too. But the greenhorns to this sport aren't worried because they know that just outside town are two areas, Sunshine and Lake Louise that of-

fer excellent trails for bull riders and ponies alike.

The bunkhouse we have chosen to stay in is called the Ptarmigan Inn and has all the amenities of a fine ranch house, including a sauna and therapeutic whirlpool for those thrown from their mounts during the day. 
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



The Sore-Throat, Burning-Eyes, Dry-Skin-on-a-Ski-Trip Medicine

As if there were not enough to worry about on a ski trip, why add the worry of the effects of low humidity? Low humidity is a major cause of the tired, red, burning eyes, the early morning sore throat, and the dry, scratchy, flaking skin. Do not despair; there are several solutions to the above problems.

The major eye problems are burning, redness, and tiredness. Contact lense wearers seem to be more frequent sufferers of eye problems than nonwearers. In general, the causes are excessive drying (low humidity and wind) and local irritation (sun). Wearing goggles and a good pair of polarized sunglasses cuts down on eye irritation by blocking the wind and lowering the light levels. Of special note for people who have had cataract surgery or lens implant, you need to use glasses with UV 400 lenses to protect eyes from the high levels of ultraviolet radiation. For overall relief from the effects of sun. wind, and low humidity after a hard day on the slopes, a warm, steamy towel placed over the eyes will help.

Contact wearers — besides needing the above advice, here are more solutions to your particular problems. It is very important to remember not to exceed your maximum wearing time. It is very easy to forget, especially when you are up early in the morning to ski all day and then party late into the night. A suggestion here: in that afternoon break take your contacts out and wear your glasses to give your eyes a rest. You can then put your contacts back in before you go out for the evening.

If you wear hard contacts you may have noticed that you have pain when you take your contacts out at night and again when you put them back in in the morning. It is due to the contacts drying out. Soaking your contacts in saline (salt) solution overnight will restore the moisture in the lenses. Also, you need to add moisture to your eyes during the day by using ADAPT drops about four times a day. For soft contact wearers to help maintain the moisture in your eyes, use ADAPETTES drops about four times a day.

The sore throat commonly suffered in the morning is due to local irritation by the cold, dry air. Normallly the lining of the nose conditions the inhaled air by adding heat and moisture. In the cold, dry, mountain air, the lining becomes swollen in its attempt to condition the air properly. There is an associated increase in mucous production due to the local irritation of the lining. Both add to decreasing the efficiency of the nasal lining to do its job. This also leads to caking of the mucous which only adds to the irritation of the lining. It also allows the cold dry air to enter the throat and bronchi (breathing tubes) to further dry out the lining and cause local irritation. This is especially noticeable in the morning after the cold dry air has been allowed to hit the same area of the throat for a long period of time.

To lessen these effects there are several simple things that help add moisture to the air. The ideal solution is to carry a room vaporizer with you. Unfortunately, this is a little impractical. Decongestants available over the counter (mostly for relief of cold symptoms) will help make the mucous thinner and decrease the swelling of the nasal lining. Increasing your fluid intake helps replace the fluid lost in moisturizing the inhaled air. Two things can be done in the evening before retiring: If there is a kitchen available, boil some

water, allowing the steam to fill the room. Placing some boiling water in a pan on the floor (with enough insulation not to damage the carpet) in the bedroom will help raise the humidity of the sleeping area. An alternative method is to leave the door to the bathroom ajar or open, depending on circumstances, while you are taking your shower. This will again lift the steam from the hot water to circulate in the living area. If the above does not seem to help, a damp wash cloth over your nose and mouth at night can do wonders.

The last area of attention is the skin. It too is affected by sun, wind, and low humidity. The effects are worsened the higher the elevation, colder the temperature, faster the wind velocity, and longer the sun exposure. The skin, especially the face and hands, becomes dry, flaky, and rough. Even if you are well-adapted to the Houston sun, it is adviseable to wear some suntan lotion for protection. The sun is stronger at high altitudes because of the loss of atmospheric depth which helps to block ultraviolet rays. On the snow there is also a lot glare and reflection which increase the total amount of light. The solution is simple: adequate sun protection in accordance with your skin complexion and a good moisturizing cream or lotion in the evening, at night, and in the morning. Don't forget to protect your lips. Again, there are numerous good products on the market for lip protection (i.e., Blistex, Chap-Stik, and of course, lipsticks for the ladies).

The effects of the sun and wind make the presence of low humidity worse. The low humidity causes various physical effects which detract from an otherwise enjoyable vacation. Most of these effects can be avoided by simple planning and techniques. After all, there are a lot more things to worry about than low humidity.






on the way to Magnolia, and also Lynn Burch and Gwen Beasley who helped at the breakfast.


