Speaking of committees, the Travel and the Scrapbook Committee now have their quota of volunteer members and have begun work. Thanks to you all too and good luck!



TO BE VOTED ON AT THE MARCH MEETING:

Article III - Section 5 - Guest - Change to:

No person may attend the meetings of this Club as a guest more than two (2) times unless authorized by the Membership Vice President or the President.

Article IV - Section 5 - Audit - Change to:

The Board shall appoint an Audit Committee at its first quarterly meeting. The Committee shall report to the Board at each of the following quarterly meetings regarding the accuracy of the annual financial statement and the adequacy of the current financial systems.

Article VI - Section 3 - Annual Reports - Change to:

All officers shall file written reports documenting their activities while in office in a manner and form acceptable to the Board of Directors no later than the second quarterly meeting following the end of their term of office.






