were definitely the losers.



ARTICLE II: **OBJECT**

Section 1. OBJECT: The object of this Club is to encourage interest and educate members in safe snow skiing.

ARTICLE III: **MEMBERSHIP**

Section 5. GUEST: No person may attend the meetings of this Club as a guest more than twice unless the person is a member of the Texas Ski Council or the person is a member's spouse acquired after the Club's membership renewal date.

SKI TRIP ELIGIBILITY:

Section 8.

The spouse acquired by a member in good standing after the membership renewal date shall be allowed to participate together with that member in any Club sponsored ski trip as outlined in the Standing Rules.

ARTICLE V: NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. ELECTION: There shall be an election of officers held at the annual meeting in March. Election shall be by written ballot unless there is only one nominee for each office. Written absentee votes shall be allowed for participants on Club trips which occur on the annual meeting date if received at the Club post office box no later than midnight of the Saturday prior to the annual meeting date. The elected officers shall take office on May 1st.

IV. TRIPS (SUMMER AND WINTER)

(This change is subject to the acceptance by the membership of Space City Ski Club of the proposed amendment to By-Law, Article III, Section 8. (C).)

- A non-member of Space City Ski Club may participate in Club sponsored ski trips in accordance with either of the
 - The spouse acquired by a member in good standing after the membership renewal date shall be allowed to participate together with that member in any Club sponsored ski trip if the spouse, having applied for membershp and the membership is closed, pays the required dues in order to take advantage of the first available membership opening.
 - Members of ski clubs belonging to the Texas Ski Council may participate in Club trips in accordance with the following guidelines;
 - A non-member of Space City Ski Club, Inc. shall be allowed to participate in a Club trip if:
 - The applicant for the Club trip is a member in good standing of any member club of the Texas Ski Council, and
 - Is otherwise qualified and approved for participation by the applicable Space City Ski Club Trip Chairperson.
 - The resolution of the Texas Ski Council is incorporated into these Standing Rules in its entirety as follows: (No further change)

MEMBERSHIP

- Membership waiting list shall have priorities as follows:
 - A spouse acquired by a member in good standing after the membership renewal date shall have first priority.
 - Non-members who have participated on a SCSC ski trip the previous year and desire membership in SCSC may, upon application, have second priority.
 - All other applications in order of the date received.
- Membership in the Space City Ski Club is at all times considered to be an individual membership.
- Membership may be resigned in writing and by returning the membership card to the Vice President of Membership. The vacancy is to be filled by the Executive Committee in accordance with the By-Laws and Standing Rules.


