

RMSA also provides support to the Texas Ski Council and its member Clubs. Club members receive reduced rate memberships in RMSA as well as a onetime lift ticket discount equal to the \$5 membership fee. A few of the other benefits include ski theft protection, a 10-issues-a-year newspaper, the **Skiing Annual**, insurance programs and others.





#### further proposed by-law change

ARTICLE V, SECTION 5. This section of the by-laws has a proposal from the floor which adds the words "at least". It would thus read as follows:

Section 5. NOMINEES. The Nominating Committee shall present **at least** one nominee for each office at the regular meeting immediately preceding the annual meeting. Any further nominations from the floor must be made at this regular meeting. Consent to serve shall have been secured from all nominees.

#### FOR:

At present, the nominating committee is constrained to proposing one and only one nominee for each office. This By-laws change would allow the nominating committee to name more than one nominee, if they so choose.

The one or two day span between the official announcement of the nominees (in the February **sitzmarke**) and the February nominating meeting, severely handicap any potential nominees from the floor. But the probability is very good that there is more than one capable and interested candidate for most offices. Therefore, if the nominating committee is allowed, and encouraged, by the passage of this proposal to name more than one nominee, there will be more elected officers, fewer appointed officers.

#### **AGAINST:**

This proposal's objective is to encourage nomination by the nominating committee of two or more candidates for each office. This change is unnecessary and undesirable because:

1. Our existing method is accepted procedure for similar non-profit clubs.

2. We have functioned for fourteen years as a successful, well managed club.

3. Adequate methods currently exist for floor nominations, as demonstrated by two floor nominations (and subsequent elections) last season and three for the coming season.

4. Multiple nominations may result in excessive "politics" which has proven detrimental to similar clubs.

The existing election method has served the Club well and no change is needed.

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
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
