

## trip status report

The Club is sponsoring 14 trips this year to such exotic places as Lake Tahoe, Banff, and Chamonix, not to mention our standard well-received bill of fare in Colorado and Utah. Under the vigorous protests of many members, the Club will not be going to scenic Wilmot Mountain, Wisconsin (where conditions are measured in terms of inches of ice cover). Your officers were unable to negotiate suitable tent reservations with the Wisconsin Bureau of Wildlife and Reclamation. We will try again next year.

Response to trips this year has been exceptionally high for this time of year. Of the 14 trips, 8 are either full with waiting lists or are very close to being full. A word about the nature of waiting lists is in order. Everyone who has been involved in the management of a trip before can attest to the fact that waiting lists are very elusive things. What may be a 30 or 40 person list at the first meeting can very quickly dwindle to a situation where all who want to go on a specific trip ultimately will be accommodated. If you wish to take a specific trip and it already has a substantial waiting list, do not be discouraged! Put your name on the waiting list as the likelihood is high that you will be able to join the trip.

The Lake Tahoe trip this year was originally designed to accommodate 90 members. At the last meeting, not only did 90 members sign up for the trip, but an additional 97 members signed on the waiting list. At its last meeting, your Executive Committee voted to increase the size of the Tahoe trip from 90 to 126. The Club will guarantee air line and lodging and other accoutrements for each of the additional 36 members. However, the Club will not reserve a bus for transportation from San Francisco to Tahoe unless 126 members actually remain; the additional increment of participants

will need to find their own transportation to Tahoe from San Francisco. The same procedure was followed two years ago and created little inconvenience. The overall price of the trip would be adjusted and rental cars used for the missing transportaion.

We are also in a waiting line status for the two Texas Ski Week trips, Aspen Traditional, and Banff. Vail (Thanksgiving), Aspen II, and the Chamonix trip are very close to filling. The Christmas trip as well as the other Spring trips all have space available.

None of us can recall trips being filled quite so quickly as they have this year. We urge you to sign up early so that you will not be disappointed at the unavailability of spaces at a later meeting.

The atmosphere is worth noting due to the unpretentious exterior of **Bertha's**. The older building show signs of age on the outside, but the vaulted ceiling, clean white walls and well-set tables lend an air of elegance and comfort to this month's **Eatzmarke** selection.
