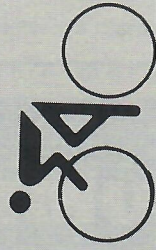
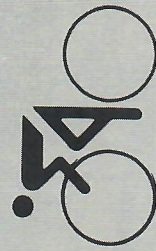

markemaker

LEONA ALLEN

Who would expect a grandmother's new hobby to be skiing? Well, Leona Allen's motto is "Better Late Than Never." Her first skiing

experience was Aspen six years ago when daughter Marjean Doucette said, "Mother, you just HAVE to go!" Her most vivid recollection of that first trip was the number of falls she took coming downhill, and this led her to think perhaps there would be less probability of this fate in cross-country skiing. She tried it during her international trips with Space City to Innsbruck, Chamonix, Zermatt, and Banff. Leona admits she still takes more than her share of the spills, but counteracts her aches and frustration with the enjoyment she receives from her association with fellow SCSCers.

Leona is more than accustomed to sharing in activities with the younger generation. Besides rearing three children of her own, she has taught the Three R's to thousands during the past forty-eight years. Leona's recent retirement from the teaching profession culminates a lifetime of diligent involvement in both personal pleasure and duty. Her love of sports was illuminated at an early age when she earned

public recognition as a high school tennis champ. After graduation Leona considered making a career of her pastime as a jazz pianist on radio, but she saw no monetary future in it. Instead, she attended a year of college to earn a teaching certificate, and accepted an assignment in a one-teacher school in Katy for \$700 a year. Her first experience not only consisted of teaching all subjects to all grades, but of being janitor, nurse, librarian, and general work horse. It was truly a unique beginning.

To keep up with revisions in teaching qualifications, Leona returned to college as a part-time student, and graduated in 1933 as the second official graduate of the University of Houston, fronted alphabetically by Alpha Alice Adams. Forty-three years and a Masters Degree later, Leona sees retirement as a high point, but no stopping place. She already has plans to begin tutoring, with frequent time off for participation in various activities with both SCSC and her Delta Mu group of Delta Kappa Gamma.

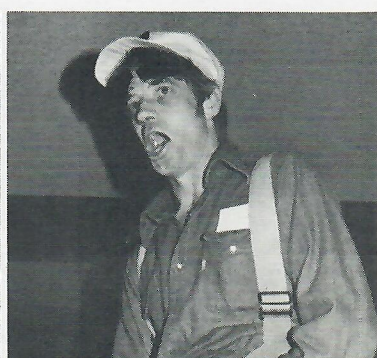

Frank has now been a SCSC member for ten years, averaging two ski trips a year, and participating in numerous non-ski activities as well. Frank says he skies primarily for enjoyment, after ten years he's finally reached the intermediate level of ability "... by dint of many lessons, conscientious effort, and finally getting a shorter pair of skis." Frank was born in Peoria, Illinois where he spend his early years on an Illinois dirt farm, "a Northern equivalent of Tobacco Road." After acquiring a BS in Mechanical Engineering from Rice University, he went to work for General Electric in Schenectady, N.Y., but he soon had enough of Yankeeland and re-

turned to Houston as an electrical draftsman with Brown & Root. Currently Staff Electrical Project Engineer, his duties have included projects in twenty states, plus temporary assignments in London, Scotland, and Holland in connection with North Sea offshore oil production.

His hobbies include swimming, dancing, volleyball, bicycling, tennis, and collecting antiques. More than a hobby is Frank's interest in singing, which over the years has developed into a sideline profession. Beginning as a "gittar picker in a hillbilly band" in college, his desire to improve his folk music led to singing lessons, which eventually broadened to interest in musical comedy and opera.

He has been a soloist in various churches, has sung with the Houston Symphony Chorale, the Houston Summer Symphony, the Houston Grand Opera and participated in their "Opera-in-the-Schools" program. He has performed leading roles in several Gilbert and Sullivan Operettas, and played principal parts in several musical comedy productions at the now defunct Playhouse Theatre, and Theatre, Inc. He's an active participant in musical comedy and light opera for banquets, civic clubs, and country clubs, as well as our own Space City Ski Club.

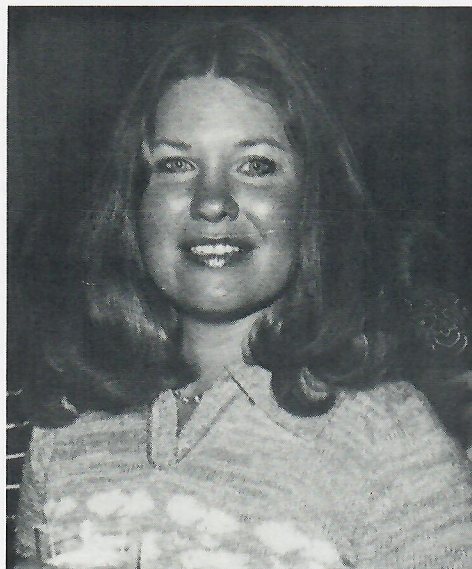

texas ski council meeting

A most productive annual meeting of the Texas Ski Council (TSC) was held in Austin, Texas on April 24, 1976. It was attended by 29 people from seven clubs and representatives of Texas International Airlines, Continental Airlines, Lake Tahoe, Copper Mountain, and Park City. Jim Benefield, Sy Liebergot and Bob Olsen attended the meeting for Space City Ski Club. A highlight of the meeting occurred for SCSC when Bob Olsen, 1975-76 SCSC President was elected President of the Texas Ski Council.

Jack Dunn, outgoing TSC president, conveyed to the Council assurances by Crested Butte that the Bo Callaway investigation in no way has affected Crested Butte's financial stability and ability to fulfill all commitments to Texas Ski Week. Crested Butte was reaffirmed as the site of the 1977 Texas Ski Week.

The conduct of the 1976 races was discussed. Suggestions for improvement were 1) to decide the individual honors by a NASTAR Race and 2) the Club trophy by fun races. Also, an impartial race results committee should be appointed.

SCSC announced that they would not send a representative to the May RMD Convention since their association with RMD to date has not been productive. The TSC bylaws specify that "Texas Ski Council is an administrative division of the RMD of the USSA." Consideration was given to dropping TSC affiliation with RMD, but the Council was undecided on this point.

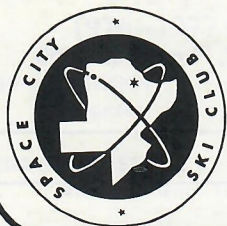
