MIKE KELLY

"I hadn't ever thought of snow skiing as something I'd want to try," were the famous last words of now veteran skier, Mike Kelly. It all began while visiting friends in Vermont over New Year's holiday about ten

years ago. Althought not exactly enthusiastic over the prospect of such an unlikely delight as sliding and tumbling down snowy hillsides, Mike was persuaded to try his hand (better yet, his feet!) at skiing Sugar Bush. He resolved this challenge in the words of the old mountain climber's motto, "I did it because it was there." And he's been doing it ever since.

Tipped on Space City Ski Club by word of mouth, he soloed to his first meeting six seasons ago, and has been one of our most active participants. Mike averages at least three trips a year, ans has skied almost every area on the Club's agenda including Steamboat, Taos, Lake Tahoe, Banff, Purgatory, Telluride, Salt Lake City, Mt. Hood, Winter Park, and Vail. Aspen tops his list with five trips and he plans visit no. 6 this year: "The SCSC Aspen Traditional Trip is traditional with me." Vacation schedule permitting, he also hopes to make trips to Jackson Hole and Telluride.

Many fellow members may recognize Mike as their friendly trip

physician, having assisted with everything from colds and flu to cuts, bruises, breaks and hangovers. In actuality, he is a General Surgeon at Hermann Hospital, presently in Plastic Surgery residency. Mike has served as the President of the House Staff at Hermann for the past two years, and as Vice-President the previous year. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the American Trauma Societies of Harris County and of the State of Texas.

In any spare time he can find in non-ski season, Mike enjoys hunting, water skiing, sports car racing, and, when the wind is right, racing sailboats. And although retired from the pro ranks with his college recording group, Mike still finds pleasure in strumming on his guitar and banjo.

This Markemaker might be remembered for his beneficial contribution in the general interest of the Club with his pointers on skiing safety last Fall, or as the perhaps overshadowed partner of Bobbett Cross in the 1975 SCSC Fashion Show.

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

ASPEN TRADITIONAL JANUARY 22 - JANUARY 29,'77

Aspen is gearing up for our Traditional Space City Ski Trip; it takes all year! One hundred sleepy people will depart Houston International near the hour of 4:30 a.m. January 22. We are to arrive in Grand Junction at 7:00 a.m. and either fly to Aspen to take chartered buses, nice to have a choice! We will arrive in Aspen before lunch,

giving us time to eat, rent skis, acquire lift tickets and for those especially speedy, there will be a half day of great skiing! The beginning of six full days and two half days of skiing; the best Colorado has to offer. With free transportation to four mountains: Aspen Mountain, Aspen Highlands, Buttermilk, Snowmass; it's hard to decide which one first.

For the beginners and intermediates Buttermilk/Tieback offers slopes especially developed for those new at skiing. Aspen Highlands has a vertical rise of 3,800 feet and provides 50 miles of trails. Snowmass, consisting of Campground, Sam's Knob, Big Burn, Alpine Springs and Elk Camp offers 1,420 acres of fine skiing. Last, but not least, Aspen Mountain for advanced and advanced intermediates (high intermediates?) offer 500 acres of trails.

We will be staying at Chateaux Eaux Claire and Roaring Fork across the street from each other and within walking distance of Aspen Mountain lifts. The accommodations feature 2 bedroom/2 bath units, and also 3 bedroom/3 bath units, each equipped with living room, fireplace and kitchens. The Chateaux also offers a great heated pool (bring your swim suits), and whirlpool for those with tired bodies; and for those not so tired, there is a paddle tennis court and a coed sauna.

After a day of skiing, an hour in the whirlpool and sauna, it's time to eat! And eat we will! Aspen offers restaurants and night life par excellence. Warren assures me he has sampled them all. Restaurants of all countries and all prices, hot dogs to fondue, you'll be sure to find something that suits your taste.





I think I know where it comes from, but I wonder where it goes

Those of you who read the financial statement in the August Sitzmarke may have noticed that Members' Equity was \$21,439, (about \$15.30 per person), an increase of \$1,388 over 1974/75 (about \$1.00 per member). You might also have noticed that ski and non-ski trip income was \$205,355, and expenses were \$208,575.

Space City Ski Club is a pretty big operation, comparable in financial size to a McDonald's franchise. This article will try to show you where SCSC money comes from, and where it goes.

Ski trips, and most non-ski activities are budgeted for zero profit. The actual trip participants pay

for their trip or activity. Notice I said budgeted.

Your Executive Committee reviews and approves budgets for all trips. If a trip loses money, the Club absorbs the loss; if a trip makes money, the Club uses the profit. Losses can be quite large; profits are quite small.

Where and who it will come from: 1976/77 Budget.

Dues = \$16,360 (44.9%) Right out of our pockets.

Meeting Drink Sales = \$8,500 (23.3%)

Here is where everyone can help. Those of you who observe and talk to me at the meetings can see that I'm doing my part. Bottoms Up!

Sitzmarke Advertising = \$6,500 (17.8%) Thanks to our advertisers and Cynthia Lackey.

Guest Fees = \$2,100 (5.8%)
Keep bringing those guests.
SCSC grows by work of mouth only.

Refund and Transfer Charges = \$2,000 (5.5%)

Interest Income = \$1,000 (2.7%)

Where it will go: 1976/77 Budget Sitzmarke = \$14,000 (38.4%)

\$10,350 for the printing and \$3,650 for postage.

Sonny Look's Room = \$3,500 (23.3%) We pay \$1.80 for every person who walks in the door. If you go back out to your car, flash your name tag to the counter on your way back in.

Administrative and Miscellaneous = \$4,892 (13.5%) The directory (\$1,000), the accounting computer service (\$450), Board of Directors and the Executive Committee meetings (\$510), stationary, name plates and other supplies (\$914) are the biggies here.

Liquor = \$2,200 (6.0%) 20% bourbon, 20% gin, 20% vodka, 40% scotch.

Membership Processing = \$2,043 (5.6%) \$1,350 for computer service.

Officer and Trip Director Travel Allowance = \$2,825 (7.7%)

This comes out of the general fund rather than the trip fund, because the officers work for skier and non-skier alike.

Programs = \$1,500 (4.1%)
The volunteer party gets \$600,
the Summer Bash got \$400.
U.S.S.A. and Texas Ski Council
Dues = \$500 (1.4%)

Now you've been numbered and visual-aided. I hope you see that this ain't no schlock operation; we're big, baby, big! If you have any questions or suggestions, grab me at the meeting; I've got lots of free time until the meetings over. And, all of the officers can use help and helpers. Even Sy.
