# by·laws amendment

A proposal has been made to have member clubs allow participation in their ski trips by members of other Texas Ski Council Clubs, but under certain restrictions. The suggested procedure would be to open trips to outside clubs 60 days prior to a trip departure. Members of the other clubs could reserve a trip space upon payment of a \$100 deposit, with full payment due at the designated date. The advantages of this would be to help insure that all trips depart with full participation, to allow for greater communication between members of the various clubs, and to prompt members to sign up for their own club trips sooner. In the case of Space City Ski Club, we would probably want to delay opening of our trips to other Ski Council Clubs until the time full payment for a trip is due. This is generally 30 to 45 days prior to a trip departure.

The above suggestion requires a change in the by-laws of the Space City Ski Club in order that it may be implemented. It has been decided to present the necessary change in the by-laws to the membership for vote at the March meeting. The proposed change is as follows:

"ARTICLE III Section 8. Ski Trip Eligibility.

- A. A person must be a member in good standing of Space City Ski Club in order to participate in any Club sponsored ski trip.
- B. A person who is a member in good standing of a member ski club of the Texas Ski Council may participate in Club sponsored ski trips, but only under the restric-

tions imposed on such participation as outlined in the standing rules."

Please give the proposed by-law change your consideration and be ready to vote at the March 10 meeting. At last, Bob Petner, we are going to report on those little known establishments that serve the most refreshing salads, sandwiches and beverages anywhere. These places are unique because you can eat your fill of a good nourishing meal for under two dollars and because they serve no meat.

The SUNSHINE HOUSE at 2111 Norfolk is located off Shepherd just north of the SW Freeway. My first experience there was a super spaghetti dinner prepared by guest chef Jackie McCauley of K101 Radio. She used soy protein instead of meat and I couldn't tell the difference! Hot meals are served only on Wednesday night ... home cookin' night.

Terry's regular menu has fruit and garden salads, sandwiches

such as the Agreement (a fresh combination of avocado mix, cucumber and onion slices all covered with melted cheese, smoke-flavored protein bits and mushrooms) nestled comfortably in a 9 x 6 inch plate, and "Liquados" which combine milk, honey, ice, spices and fresh fruit. Beer, wine and entertainment (guitar ballads for tips) provide the balance. Monday through Saturday for lunch and dinner.

Not too far away, is the grand-dad of vegetarian restaurants in Houston. It has been there a few years and is called the HOBBIT HOLE. You can find it at 1715 Shepherd, north of West Gray.

J. B. and Hobie carry on the J. R. R. Tolkien tradition. Home made breads, raw mushrooms and avocados are used in making sandwiches which bear the names of Bilbo Baggins, Gandalf and other heroes from the *Lord of the Rings*. Homemade organic bread is used for the sandwiches and can be purchased upstairs. Beer, wine and smoothies provide liquid pleasure.

Easter skiers at Vail will find no shortage of eating places to drop their loot.

Vail USSA Trip Chairman Joe Murphy recommends THE LEFT BANK. THE NEW GNU may not have reopened since our red hot skiers visited in January . . burned out, we hear. Try the quiche lorraine at ALAIN's down by the river, but beware the soups as they are clear, not thick hearty soups for skiers.

A letter to the editor notes that the China Palace at Westheimer and Sage, recently mentioned in this column, has suffered the wrath of Channel 13's Marvin Zindler and the City Health Inspector. It seems that both gentlemen's cleanliness standards were violated.

A review of the 75 restaurants covered to date in this column


How's that, Sports Fans? *Odds and Ends:*
