

Many of us today housed in the concrete environment of the city feel the "call of the wild", but not many of us respond as enthusiastically as JANE and JERRY KEARBY. Last summer they went backpacking in Montana and before that scuba diving in Cozumel. Closer to home they frequently fish, hunt, camp, canoe, and play tennis. Jerry explains that he likes anything to do with the outdoors as long as "it's not in the backyard."

Many of you might remember Jane Kearby as Jane Morgan. She and Jerry met in Steamboat on a Club trip. Jerry says she "picked him up on the slopes," but Jane tells a different story. Jerry credits himself with having taught lane to stop on skis. Jane had only skied once before meeting Jerry. Her approach to skiing was strictly downhill racer style. Not knowing how to stop, she simply plummeted straight down until she reached the bottom. Consequently, all of Jane's ski runs were very short and very quick. Looking back, Jane says of her earlier ski days, "There's a fine line between courage and stupidity." Seriously, Jane and Jerry are both excellent skiers. In their five years with the Club, averaging three trips a year, neither of them has ever been injured. They credit this to having taken lessons and having received good instructions as well as

not skiing when tired. Jerry emphasizes that no one is ever too old to start skiing. He did not start skiing until he was forty. He took up skiing simply because he had done everything else and skiing looked like fun. He got on skis, fell the first time and fell in love with it.

Both Jane and Jerry have been active in the Club. Jerry served as president of the Texas Ski Council this past 1974-75 season. He was also SCSC Vice President of Programs 1973-74 and a trip chairman 1972-73. One endeavor, for which we will always be grateful to Jerry, was his instituting the White Water Canoe Trips which we all enjoy so much. Jane served as Club Secretary 1972-73 and was on the 1974 Nominating Committee. Both have been lift-liners and have helped at the membership table.

Jane is a native of Kansas. After college at Kansas State, Jane spent a number of years in California in a most "fun" job. She was employed in sales and public relations for KLM Royal Dutch Airlines. Her first year there, she was required to learn airline operations by taking a series of familiarization trips. This meant a week or two in such cities as Madrid, Paris, Berlin, Shannon, and of course, Amsterdam. (KLM's headquarters are in Amsterdam.) Eventually tired of jumping from country to country, Jane decided to locate more permanently in Houston. She went to work as a secretary for Boeing at NASA. For the past three years, she has been secretary for the chairman of the board at Western Bank.

Jerry is a native Texan, hailing from Fort Worth. A veterinarian by profession, he came to Houston after graduating from Texas A&M and has been practicing in the greater Houston area ever since. He specializes in small animals.

Currently, the Kearby's are "into photography." Jane enrolled in a photography course hoping to be able to take better pictures of their outdoor trips. We'll be looking forward to the pictures they will take on the slopes next year. Who knows? If Jane gets good enough, she might get a picture of Jerry doing that famous Aggie Slalom!

WHAT IS RMD DOING FOR THE HOUSTON SKIER?

An article in the latest Rocky Mountain Skiing (the monthly publication of RMD) called attention to a bill pending before the Colorado State Legislature which will impose a 7% tax on all ski activities such as lift tickets, ski lessons, and equipment rentals. The bill as originally introduced included all recreational activities, but due to pressures exerted by concerned citizens, the bill was amended to exclude all amusements except SKI-ING.

The amended bill has been passed by the House and has been sent to the Senate (this was in May). Final passage of this bill would add up to \$15 to the cost of each ski trip Space City Ski Club offers to its members. The article mentioned above urged all skiers to write members of the Colorado Senate Business Affairs & Labor Committee (whose members it identified) and protect passage of this bill.

Did you get this urgent information which will affect you financially? Did you have an opportunity to protect this discriminatory legislation? If you are a member of RMD, the answer to these questions is yes. This is only one area in which RMD (Rocky Mountain Division) of USSA (United States Ski Association) benefits all skiers, including the Houston skiers. A strong RMD can exert its influence in many

Your membership in RMD not only helps it become a stronger organization, but provides you with important information regarding pending legislation, ski safety, ski areas, other ski clubs, racing and many other interesting subjects. What does your membership cost? NOTHING if you plan to ski the Rocky Mountains this winter. The \$5 annual dues is immediately returned through a \$5 lift ticket discount. Even if you do not plan to ski this winter, you could not find a better way to contribute to the support of better skiing and a better U.S. Ski Team.

It is my hope that at least onefourth of our 1,300 members, or 300 plus persons, will join RMD this season. We are one of the largest ski clubs in the country and last year less than 50 of our members supported RMD. This compares with 861 from Kansas City Ski Club and 549 from Phoenix Ski Club. We must do better. Use the application in this issue of your Sitzmarke and support RMD NOW!!!

Unfortunately, the ski season 1974-1975 seemed to be more accident plagued than any other year. At several meetings last year, Harry Gaston expressed concern about the increased injury frequency. I came home from one of those meetings and wrote my analysis of the problem.

There is no doubt in my mind that this problem is directly related to the lack of realism which the meetings convey to the not yet begun or to the beginning skier. The programs are not realistic, practical or educational due to the films provided by the airlines or ski areas which show only freestyle and powder skiing. In the three years that I have been attending meetings, only one has had an educational speaker and only one has had a demonstration. Or did I see that demonstration at a YHC (Young Houstonian Club) beer bust at the Downtown V.I.?

The beginner skier should have some time under his belt which has informed him of the physical stress, levels of skiing ability and the mixture of good common sense and courage required on each slope. The "Fantasy Flicks" do not make the new skier aware of the importance

of the fact that he must start slow and not ski above his abilities or physical condition. They do not suggest that it is better to fall down rather than to try to pull yourself back into control time after time. No doubt, the fall is as important to a novice as the snowplow -- and who told this novice how to put on the equipment and adjust it before he went out for his first snowplow run? Has he been made aware that snow skiing is pure work for the beginner and more difficult than water skiina?

O.K. So it is good for advertisements in the Sitzmarke to invite air carriers and ski areas to donate films. Well, Ruth Roy and/or J. Rich may be able to get some manufacturers' representatives to come in and talk equipment and how to make sure that the skier gets the proper equipment for his needs and specific application. These reps could give insight into why and how equipment is adjusted. That's good advertisement. Invite the ski area PR men; better yet - women. But ask them to bring movies used for training skiers. Some areas must have some means of assisting its instructors. Has anyone ever had a session on First Aid for the ski slope?

The articles in the Sitzmarke about riding lifts, being in shape, etc. are about the only source of realistic skiing enlightenment we have. A beginner skiing program now and then at the first of the ski year and maybe during the middle of the season would not hurt mem-

bership or attendance.

Let's make the programs more realistic and applicable to the members of Space City Ski Club. Make the ski programs compatible with us Texans who are more at home in the 98% humidity with Bar-B-Que and beer than on the slope with a pair of 190 cm. skis and cumbersome clothing. The 'Fantasy Flicks' have become a bore and are not enlightening. Attempt to make some of the programs worthwhile and educational, and perhaps the injury frequency will decrease.

As everyone knows, it's too hot in Houston during July to develop an appetite. However, the climate is just right for consuming your favorite beverages. Besides, it's a good way to lose the ten to fifteen pounds of excess weight you've picked up during the year. In case you're looking for a new place to imbibe, you might find one in the following list:

THE BROWN BARN TAVERN (West of town on Westheimer) Ride your motorcycle out Westheimer and drink beer and play pool with the local rice farmers.

THE DARK HORSE (5706 Richmond near Chimney Rock) Inflation hasn't hit here. Mixed drinks and beer. A good atmosphere for solving the world's problems.

ROZNOVSKY GROCERY and HAMBURGER STAND (5719 Feagan at Birdsall) Beer is fifty cents and the hamburgers are great! A good place on Saturday afternoon. Jim Plummer and Ann Rienstra have been spotted here frequently.

WESTHEIMER GOLF CENTER (5411 Chimney Rock) The best value in Houston - Budweiser is thirty cents per can - open every night until ten.

.. QUIET and COMFORTABLE ..

SWISS CHALET RESTAU-RANT (511 South Post Oak Lane) A good place to socialize with fellow SCSC members after the Monday meetings.

LA PAVILLON (1415 Post Oak Park) Saturday night - "Paris After Midnight". Sounds good, but this place is expensive and the best thing about it is the wallpaper in the men's restroom.

THE POTTING SHED (behind Jeremiah's Greenhouse - 1399 So. Voss Road at Woodway) Very comfortable, contemporary decor, small dance floor with a trio for listening or dancing.

THE BIG MOUTH FROG (2727 Crossview - just off West-

heimer) An excellent singing-guitar playing duo in the balcony bar. Comfortable seating.

VARGO'S (2401 Fondren - just off Westheimer) A comfortable bar with live entertainment for listening and a view of a beautiful garden. Try walking across the swinging bridge as you leave.

STEAMBOAT SPRINGS (4919 West Alabama) Quiet, apres ski atmosphere with a folk singer. Deli sandwiches, Saturday night only.

THE FRENCH QUARTER BAR (on the mezzanine level in the Whitehall Hotel - downtown on Smith Street) An excellent bar after work or before dinner.

CK's (atop the Houston Host Hotel at the Houston Intercontinental Airport) Next time you have a flight, get there early and try this revolving bar. You can take the train over, have a drink and get back before you would even be served in the terminal bars.

..... NOISY and FUN

LA BASTILLE CLUB (716 Franklin-downtown, Market Square area) Can be a good place, depending on the name entertainment appearing. However, New Year's Eve is a crowded rip-off.

GALLERIA ROOF (atop Houston Oaks Hotel - Galleria Shopping Center on Post Oak) Good entertainment for dancing and a nice view. Usually crowded. Good happy hour hors d'oeuvres.

DADDY'S MONEY (5250 W. Alabama) The Friday afternoon place to be.

GRIF'S SHILLBLAGH INN (3416 Roseland) Great on Saint Patrick's Day. During hockey season, they take a bus to the Aero's games.

TGI FRIDAY's (5010 Richmond) Admit it, we've all been there. Food, drinks and Tiffany lamps.

RUBAIYAT RESTAURANT and BAR (7011 Southwest Freeway) They were having a brawl so I didn't stay long. Live band and dancing.

747 CLUB (Westheimer between Winrock and Fountainview)

Raunchy but harmless. Be sure to check out the waitress who had her nipples pierced in Las Vegas. This place seems better if you make it one of your last stops for the evening.
