Kay Nevels, our secretary, was selected to sit at the head table during the awards banquet. This was quite an honor as she was one of only ten to be selected.

Continued support of, and participation in the Rocky Mountain Division of United States Ski Association is a must for our club. With the renewed efforts of environmental groups, the only way skiing will survive is with a strong U.S. Ski Association to represent us. I for one, am glad there is such an organization to look out for my skiing interests.



"Drive the knee, let me see that pelvic thrust!"


Now Ed, there is a time and place for everything,

#### ski tips

This time of year, Spring Time, brings forth many problems in skiing that are unique. If you handle them properly, your trip will be successful. If not, you will have many a miserable night plus you could lose several days of skiing.

In the higher elevation of the Rocky Mountains, the sun can be your enemy. You can burn in a matter of an hour's exposure. If you do not protect your eyes, the eyeball can be burned after an exposure of a couple of hours.

Those of you who are a little bald on the top of the head (as some of you are), you should protect the top of your head. Use a light cap or hat, preferably with a bill so the forehead is shaded. A good brand of sun shield (not sun tan lotion) and lip shade is a must.

I have seen many cases of fever blistered lips, swollen eyes and burnt eye lids, and noses that look like they need a transplant - all very painful.

Spring weather can be deceptive. It can be extremely warm one day and the next be freezing. On a spring ski trip, go prepared for extremely hot weather, extremely cold weather, and with protective cosmetics for the skin and lotions for sunburn.

Above all, wear sun glasses. If you forgot your sun glasses and only have your yellow goggles, use them. They will deflect the suns rays as well. Yellow goggles do not increase the glare of the sun as most people think. Yellow, of course, is best used on cloudy and foggy days, but they are also helpful in sunlight especially if you forgot your regular sun glasses.

The ski season is over, but you will probably find many of the above hints useful this summer.
