

EXCITEMENT EUROPE '72 CHAMONIX - GENEVA - PARIS February 17-28

Our Air France jet flight (A.F. No. 066) will depart for Paris from Houston Intercontinental Airport on Thursday night, February 17. Please be at Terminal "B" at the airport at 8:30 p.m. A full course dinner will be served shortly after take-off. Don't forget your passport!!! Clothes luggage will be limited to 44 pounds per person, so hold it down to one large suit-

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case and one piece of carry-on hand luggage other than ski boots. (In other words, don't bring more luggage than you yourself can carry and chances are you won't bust the weight limit). Ski containers will be available at the airport for those taking their own skis.

We'll arrive at Chamonix-Argentiere Friday evening (come on now, the journey's not that long . . . remember, there's a time change), where we'll have 7 full days of skiing. Plans have been made for an *optional* (at modest cost) one-day side trip into Switzerland, mid-week of our stay in Chamonix, for some breathtaking sightseeing and delicious Swiss cuisine. This trip will be subject to favorable weather conditions and sufficient interest - a poll will be taken aboard the plane to determine the latter.

On Friday, February 25, we'll motor to Geneva to spend 2 nights. Assistant Trip Chairman Willi Schaufelbuhl (who is from Switzerland) has the inside low-down on things to do and the places to go in Geneva. The final night of our European adventure will be spent in Paris. Our jet flight home (A.F. No. 067) will depart Paris Monday morning, February 28, and arrive in Houston at 2:50 P.M. that afternoon.


VAIL - TRIP A March 28 – April 2

SKI TIPS by Ed Williams Certified RMSIA PSIA

Most every ski trip I go on there is at least one day it snows. I hear many of you say "I can't handle this powder snow". It is especially difficult for the snowplow skier and the stem turn skier. There is a different technique, generally, used in powder and once you get into it, skiing powder becomes thrilling.

First you need to get the tip of the skies planning towards the surface of the snow. This is accomplished by sitting back slightly putting the center of gravity back of the heel. Also, a ski with a soft shovel or tip will aid in the tips riding toward the surface.

Second, you need to ski with the weight equally distributed on both skis. If you have one ski weighted more than the other, one ski will tend to sink down as the other rises toward the surface.

Third, you need to unweight the skis and turn them while unweighted and come down on both skis again.

There are several ways to do this but what works best for me is to prepare for the unweighting by dropping the fanny down and then punching up by bringing my

entire body in an upward motion as I punch my arm on the outside of the turn up high and punch down with my pole plant on the inside of the turn. This has the effect of putting my body in a rotating motion. I-block the rotation so I do not overturn and come down with even weight on both skis, sinking down again in preparation for the next turn.

The key in skiing powder is the unweighting and until you start to learn this phase, you are going to be frustrated skiing powder.

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R M D NEWS 1992 Olympics

Do you believe in the United States Olympic Ski Team? Santa Claus? How about the Easter Bunny? The 1992 Olympic team does because its members are only five or six years old now. And the 1976 team believes in Santa Claus, too. To them, Santa Claus is someone like yourself who, through donations to the Olympic and Ski Team funds, will make it possible for them to train for four more years and then go to the Olympics and compete for the United States. Surely you won't disappoint them. A small donation or purchase and display of ski team pins would scarcely impact your finances.

But what of the 1992 Olympians? How can we help them? In the first place, where do you think Olympic team members come from? Does a talent scout for the coaching staff spot likely looking candidates hanging around the local drug store? Not likely. These young skiers are watched at every step of their development from age five or six or whenever they begin

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to show promise and as they age and improve, their name spreads just the same as a hotshot quarterback's would. Eventually, voluntary. interested people will travel to see them race, just as college and pro scouts go to see their prospects. With one very big exception however. There are no highly organized competitions through the public school system in skiing as there are in football, basketball, etc. Skiers don't go out for the high school team and play against Podunk Hollow with a paid attendance of hundreds of spectators. How then does he compete? Who coaches him? Who pays for his equipment? How in the world does anyone ever learn enough about skiing to become of Olympic caliber? Remember. we are competing against the world's best and being successful.

The answer is USSA. This one organization through its divisions such as the RMD is training the 1992 Olympic team right now. The USSA governs races, sanctions and classified competitors, buys timing equipment, trains coaches and skiers, provides funds for numerous racing activities including coaches salaries, provides and trains racing officials and many other activities necessary to support development of skiers
