

SKI TIPS By Ed Williams Certified RMSIA & PSIA

An important principal in turning skis is unweighting. In the progression of ski instruction we learn unweighting in subtle ways. In the early stages, a snowplow turn is executed by transferring the weight to one ski or the other. You are also unweighting one of the skis. Unweighting, however, is not the principal involved at this point. We are learning weight transfer here.

There are 3 ways we use unweighting. Unweighting is the reduction or elimination of the skiers weight on the snow. Up-unweighting is taking the weight off the snow by an up movement of the body. For years this was the type used in the more advanced phases of parallel skiing.



Another method of unweighting is used of terrain such as going over a mogul.

The third method, down-unweighting, is now being utilized in the more advanced phases of skiing. This is accomplished by lowering the body rapidly. This reduces weight for a short period of time, which is desirable in steep terrain, icy slopes and at high speeds where security lies in contact with the snow.

An advanced skier uses all three forms in his skiing and often combines them in certain situations.




