# **Skiing Scene**

SKI TIPS
By Ed Williams

There may be some disagreement on the subject in the profession, but in the controversial area of ski technique, PSIA direction has shifted to a group of Rocky Mountain Ski Instructors. I attended a meeting of RMSIA in Santa Fe, N.M. last month on the subject of technique.

The recreational skier often thinks change is designed to induce him to take lessons or buy new equipment. The fact is the recend developments in equipment and racing techniques have generated a considerable amount of study to adopt these principles for the recreational skier.

Most of the changes in technique will only involve the intermediate and above skier. If you are taking lessons to improve your ability from these levels, you will hear some new terms used by RMSIA instructors. The terms CARVING, ANTIC-IPATION, LEVERAGE, PIVOT, and AVALEMENT will seep into the lesson. Carving and Anticipation are important progressions for the intermediate to learn.

Carving a turn is accomplished by Leverage (pressure forward.) The skier, standing in the center of the skis, presses the narrow "waist" of the ski into the snow with his body weight. The ski should carve the turn with minimal lateral slippage.

Anticipation is the movement of the upper body turning downhill as the skis are turning into the hill and edged in the end phase of the turn. In other words the chest turns toward the fall line as the skis turn into the hill. The edges are set at the point the next turn is to be initiated. Once this is mastered you are ready to progress to a more advanced stage of skiing.

## FROM THE HEAD OF THE

Skiing can be a thrilling and exhilarating sport for all levels of skiers. Competent instruction, dependable equipment and adequate conditioning will enhance the pleasure greatly and will significantly reduce the chances for accident or injury. Unfortunately the risks cannot be eliminated entirely, and although Space City Ski Club has been relatively fortunate in its injury ratio, it has not escaped completely. For this reason the Club for several seasons has maintained a group medical care policy which covered all members on Club-sponsored ski trips. The premiums for this group coverage were nominal and were included in each participant's trip cost.

The insurance industry recently reviewed ski accident coverage on a nationwide basis and, not too surprisingly, substantially increased premiums on group policies such as ours. This makes the coverage much less desirable, particularly since most members have group hospitalization and medical coverage through their employers. For this reason we have decided not to renew the group policy for this current season.

It is particularly important now that each participant on a Club ski trip review his own coverage to determine if it is adequate in the event some injury or accident should occur. For those who do not already have personal or group coverage, individual travel policies of five or ten days may be applied for, although application should be made well in advance of a planned trip. Neither the Club nor any of its officials (elected officers, trip chairmen, etc.) can be responsible for any financial problem arising from accidents or injuries.

Our Georgetown Trip is an opportunity to ski four of Colorado's major ski areas. These areas are of special interest since they are to be the site of the 1976 Winter Olympics. In our four days of skiing we'll ski Breckenridge, Winter Park, Loveland and Arapahoe. Our lodge is at Georgetown and each day, after a short ride on our chartered bus, we'll have the challenge of exploring a new ski area. An early arrival at the areas will give those who wish the opportunity to join the morning classes. These ski areas have already had snow on the ground for several weeks so it looks as if we'll have good conditions. Georgetown is an old silver-mining town rich in the color of the Old West. It's located 45 miles west of Denver and there are no mountain passes to cross on our drive from Denver. Georgetown's proximity to Denver allows us an early evening arrival Wednesday and maximum skiing time on Sunday prior to our departure.

We'll depart Houston at 4:30P.M. Wednesday November 25 and will arrive back in Houston about 10:00 P.M. November 29. Our flight will be on Continental Airlines and we'll have a full dinner served on both our flights.

The trip is now full but we will establish a waiting list in the event there are any cancellations; so if you are not signed up and are interested in joining the trip be sure to add your name to the waiting list. Total trip cost is \$165 which includes transportation, lodging at the Georgetown Inn and a cocktail party in Georgetown. Accident
