↑ Snow-plow position: Stand as if going straight down hill. Make movement of turns left and right. Breathe normally. Repeat 3 to 6 times

♥ "Stand" on knees. Bring body forward and support with arms straight, Leave hands in position. Move body back, rest on heels, Exhale. Move body forward and curve back. Bend knees. Repeat 2 to 4 times always leaving hands in same position



SKIS AND CRUTCHES

It is that time again to ski a little and hobnob alot. That's all that goes on at Colorado's other ski resort There are some of you on this trip to ...ah... Aspen, I think they call it; that contrary to all that goes on, intend to ski a considerable amount. It is ye upon whom these experienced (?) words must fall. Breaking a fall from a bar stool is not being treated in this article.

Beginners and Intermediates please remember, dress in layers for maximum warmth; be absolutely sure your boots fit well or you'll be sorry by mid-week. Double check the setting on your bindings the first day and also about mid-week. If you haven't skied since last season, go back to school for at least one day - believe me, it is worth it! Here are a few rules of the road that will make your skiing a bit more enjoyable:

- Eat a good breakfast It will keep your energy up.
- Wear sunburn cream, even on cloudy days.
- Wear your safety straps a loose ski can travel in excess of 100
- Follow the posted instructions at lifts and on the slopes, especially the slope markers. Green Square-Easiest; Yellow Triangle - More Difficult; Blue Circle - Most Difficult; Two Blue Circles Well, there is one on Aspen Mt. called Evevator Shaft and they mean it! Red Anything - Trail Closed or Dangerous Area. If you see a stick with a red flag on it, this usually means there is a rock or some other deadly trap right there - Ski around it!
- 5) Ski within your ability.
- 6) Stop when you are tired.

About liquor and skiing.... best left unsaid because halfway through the first wine & cheese party, everything I have said will be forgotten. Then Winton will go twist an ankle; Les will rip a sole off his ski book -how I don't know, but he'll manage; and Dail will be buggin everybody as he flies over moguls in his new ski cape! 
